A VERY ATTRACTIVE COUNTRY HOME

Mr. A. S. Jackson's Farm at Scotch Lake One of the Bright Spots of York County—A Ideal Model Farm.

One of the most attractive country homes in York county is that of Mr. Adam S. Jackson, of Scotch Lake, in the Parish of Queensbury. Mr. Jackson, as might be supposed, is a progressive farmer, who does things systematically. His home is located on the border of the lake, from which the settlement takes its name, and makes a fine appearance. The dwelling and barns are up to date, conveniently arranged and give evidence of the fact that the owner believes that paint has its uses, and lives up to it.

Mr. Jackson's farm is twenty-two miles from Fredericton and ten miles from a railway station, yet he farms successfully and is making money. He is a worker, not a groucher. He reads the agricultural papers, and puts in practice bright ideas and up to date methods. The man himself and the appearance of his home and farm buildings bespeak the model farmer. He has an up-to-date water system installed in his home and a small gasoline engine, which churns, separates milk and does other chores, thus lightening the burden which would otherwise fall upon the shoulders of his estimable wife. She thus has time for other things, and devotes a lot of attention to the growing of flowers.

The Flower Bed.

On the lawn in front of the house is located the largest and finest flower beds that rural New Brunswick can boast of. Every kind of flower that can be grown out of doors in this province is to be found there, even to the black sunflower. To make such a display requires much labor and patience, but this is largely offset by the pleasure derived from it.

Mr. Jackson is also the owner of a motor boat, and takes recreation in cruising about the lake. He has long been recognized as one of the most successful dairymen in York county, and for years his entire product of butter has been handled by one Fredericton grocer, who has no trouble in getting the top price for it.

If the agricultural department of the Provincial Government would divorce itself from politics and devote its energies towards having the methods followed by Mr. Jackson with such remarkable success adopted generally by the farmers of this province, then would agriculture in New Brunswick come into its own.

Hunted With Braithwaite.

The late Mr. Martindale was a great lover of the woods, and had made trips to all the big game grounds on this continent. He has hunted in Alaska, British Columbia, Wyoming, Quebec, Maine and New Brunswick. He hunted ducks on the Canadian prairies when the Canadian Pacific Railway was being built, and had water carried to him each morning by a locomotive.

His last trip to New Brunswick was made about six years ago, when he spent a month in the Miramichi woods with Guide Henry Braithwaite. Upon his return home he compiled a book in which he gave a racy account of his trip and incorporated into it some valuable lessons in natural history, secured first hand from his guide, philosopher and friend. He spent a day in Fredericton and wrote his impressions of the city to a Philadelphia paper, devoting particular attention to the hand on the steeple of the Methodist church, which interested him very much.

Previous to visiting the Miramichi Mr. Martindale made a hunting trip to the Tobique with Guide Adam Moore.

A Friend's Tribute.

Mr. Henry Braithwaite, dean of the faculty of New Brunswick guides, who is now at his home here, was much affected when informed of the death of his old friend and patron, Mr. Martindale.

"I once spent a month with him in the Miramichi woods," he told the Mail, "and got to like him very much. I have met many sportsmen in my time, but I want to say that never in all my experience have I hunted with a more interesting and companionable man than Mr. Martindale. I found him a true sportsman and a gentleman. He loved the woods, and he was a close student of nature and exceedingly well informed in regard to the habits of wild animals. I am very sorry indeed to hear that he has crossed the great divide. He was the sort of man whom one does not often meet."

RURAL MAIL DELIVERY IN KINGSCLEAR

Mail is Not Delivered to People Who Do Not Own Metal Boxes.

The rural mail delivery inaugurated in the parish of Kingsclear a few weeks ago is causing some dissatisfaction among the people, especially those who have not procured boxes.

A courier leaves Fredericton at ten o'clock in the morning and is supposed to deliver mail to all who have metal boxes erected in front of their homes or have placed orders for the same. The boxes are supplied by the government at a cost of \$4.50 each, and are large enough to hold nearly a barrel of mail matter. The owner's name is printed on each box and there is not much chance for mix-ups, although it is said that they occur quite frequently.

People who do not yet have boxes complain that they do not get any mail, and this seems to be a fact. The mail intended for them is kept in the Fredericton post office and the only way to get it is to go after it. The courier will not deliver it until an order is placed for a box, and this therefore is the remedy.

The free rural mail delivery is the correct thing, and it has come to stay. There will naturally be some confusion and dissatisfaction at first, but the matter will adjust itself in due time. Those who would enjoy the blessing must provide themselves with a box.

TWENTY-SIX VOLUNTEERS LAST NIGHT FOR KILTIES

The volunteers in the 236th Battalion's recruiting campaign numbered 110 up to noon today, which is in excess of the number expected. The strength of the battalion is now about 260. Twenty-six volunteers were enrolled last night at the various meetings. Campbellton had the banner meeting, seventeen young men coming forward. At Tracey one volunteer for the Sunbury county platoon was secured, and at Gagetown the first for the Queens county platoon volunteered. Kings and Gloucester counties gave one volunteer each, and Charlotte, Carleton and St. John gave one each.

No recruits were secured in either Albert or Victoria counties, and there was no report from the others.

Three men enlisted here yesterday afternoon and this morning for the 236th. They are Arthur Atkinson Wry, 24, Sackville; William H. Kelley, 45, Oromocto; D. J. Gregson, 29, Wallace, Idaho, U. S. A.

MORE HUNTERS COMING.

Mr. Henry Braithwaite, the veteran guide, returned on Thursday from a trip to his camps on the Little Southwest Miramichi. On Monday he will be joined by a hunting party from Pittsburg composed of Col. John Ungar, C. E. Dinkey, Homer Williams and others, who will spend three weeks at his camps. These sportsmen made several trips to the Miramichi with Mr. Braithwaite a few years ago, but of late have been going to Newfoundland for big game.

Boston Police Expert Here.

Mr. James A. Dennissy, of Boston, arrived from St. John by steamer yesterday and registered at the House. Mr. Dennissy has visited Fredericton on his vacation on several occasions. He is the homicide expert of the Boston police force and has worked on a number of famous cases. A case of interest in New Brunswick which he is now engaged in the Salem illegal operation case. Mrs. Pittfield, formerly of St. John, was wanted by the police in connection with this, but got away. Her two daughters are held by the authorities. The case will come up for trial in November.

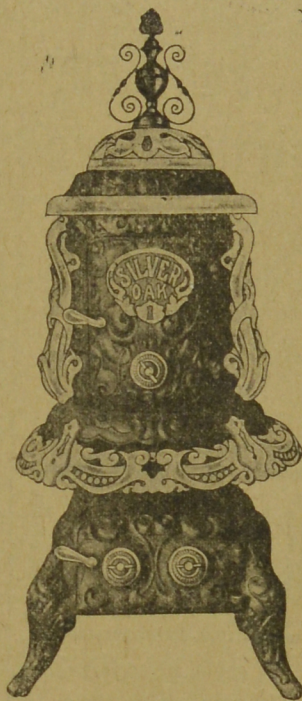

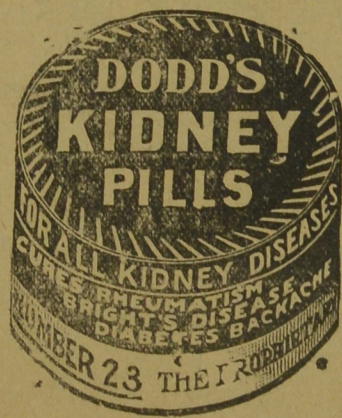
