THE EXPERT KNITTER SAYS

That the best way to join heavy
wool is to use a blunt-pointed large
eyed needle. Thread it with the
end of the wool and carefully in-
sert it through the middle of the
new piece. Run the needle up care-
fully for two inches, then put out
the needle at the side, trim off the
wool and the splice will be made.

That the best way to join light
wool is simply lap the ends. The
extra thickness for an inch or so
does not matter.

That knots are never counten-
anced by expert knitters.

That the best way to straighten
crocheted or knitted work is to
lay it on a white cotton cloth pre-
viously wrung out of cold water
and spread on a smooth table. Pin
the article in desired shape on the
cloth. Cover with a fresh, dry,
cloth and leave until the founda-
tion cloth is entirely dry.

PAPER SHADES FOR LAMPS.

Smart looking lamp shades of
water color paper are now being
decorated most attractively in black
and colors. Women who can paint
use this form of decoration, while
these who are not so gifted cut de-
signs from other paper and paste
them on. Black is used effectively
on all these shades, but while there
are still many persons who cling
to the black and white idea, the
majority of women have given up
the plain black and white deco-
rations for those resembling the black
and colored chintzes. These paint-
ed shades are used both for can-
dles and lamps and they are consid-
ered especially desirable for bed-
rooms.

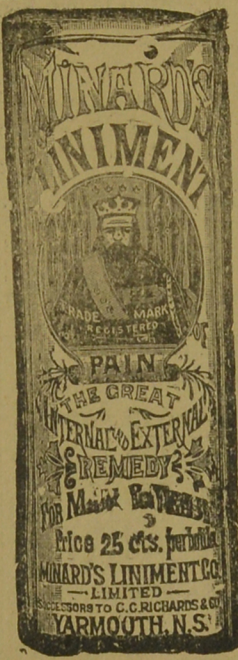
