SIR WILFRED'S RINGING SPEECH

(Continued from page two.) There had been no attempt to explain that serious discrepancy.

The Opposition's Attitude.

Sir Wilfrid stated frankly the position of the Opposition in relation to the conduct of public affairs. "We feel today," said he, "PERHAPS MORE THAN EVER THE SERIOUS RESPONSIBILITY WHICH HAS ALWAYS PERTAINED TO AN OPPOSITION, AND WHICH IN THIS TIME OF WAR IS MORE THAN EVER PRESSING."

It would be part of that duty to criticize and a far more pleasant duty to support wherever and whatever there is just cause to support. "Our sole aim will be to contribute so far as is in our power, to the final and complete victory of the Allies over Germany."

Our Supreme Aspiration.

"Our supreme aspiration," said Sir Wilfrid in concluding, "IS THAT BELGIUM SHALL AGAIN BE FREE AND PROSPEROUS AS SHE WAS, IF IT

BE POSSIBLE THAT EVER SHE MAY BE PROSPEROUS, IN VIEW OF THE AWFUL DESTRUCTION SHE HAS SUFFERED. IT IS ALSO OUR AIM THAT FRANCE SHALL HAVE HER LOST TERRITORY AND HER NATURAL BOUNDARIES RESTORED TO HER, AND THAT OLD ENGLAND SHALL RETAIN UNIMPAIRED, UNDIMINISHED AS EVER HER PRESTIGE AND HER POWER IN THE WORLD. IT IS OUR AIM THAT ENGLAND AND FRANCE SHALL BOTH RESUME AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE THEIR ONWARD MARCH TOWARD THE FUTURE ENFRANCHISEMENT OF THE HUMAN RACE FROM THE SHACKLES OF PASSION AND PREJUDICE, AND THAT IN WEAKENED GERMANY DEMOCRACY MAY BE TRIUMPHANT, AND THAT THE GERMAN PEOPLE, SOBERED FROM THEIR DREAMS OF CONQUEST AND DOMINATION, MAY RETURN TO THE PATH OF PEACE AND BENEVOLENCE WHICH AT ONE TIME CHARACTERIZED THEIR RACE." (Prolonged applause from both sides of the House.)

GERMANS HAVE EVACUATED THE FORTRESS OF LUTSK

Kiev, Russia, Jan. 18, via Petrograd and London, Jan. 19—Lutsk, the important fortress in Volhynia, one of the triangle of fortifications there, is being evacuated by the Germans, according to information obtained from prisoners arriving here. Four thousand prisoners have recently arrived here from the southwestern front.

HALT FOR REINFORCEMENTS.

London, Jan. 18—The offensive that the Russians launched against the Austro-Hungarians in East Galicia and along the Bessarabian frontier Christmas Eve, described as the "New Year's Battle," came to an end Jan. 15, according to the Austro-Hungarian war office, with the Teutons holding all their lines on the eight-mile front, having inflicted losses on the Russians estimated at seventy thousand men killed or wounded and six thousand captured.

That this ends only one phase of the offensive, however, is indicated by the Austrian official statement that Russian reinforcements are being thrown into East Galicia. The Austrians, all along, have considered that the big Russian offensive was undertaken with important military and political objects in view. To it has been attributed the dual purpose of lessening the strain on the Entente Allies in the Balkans, and possibly of causing Roumania to enter the war on the side of the Entente Allies.

Unofficial advices from Kiev are to the effect that the Germans are evacuating Lutsk, one of the triangle of fortresses in Volhynia, around which there was sanguinary fighting in the Teutonic drive of the Russians last fall.

Still farther north, to the south-east of Riga, and south of Widay, the Russians, during a snowstorm, made surprise attacks against German posts and destroyed them.

ALLIED VICTORIES.

Artillery and mining battles resulting favorably to the British and the French mark the fighting on the western front, while the Italians report the complete re-capture of the trenches at Tolmino taken in the recent

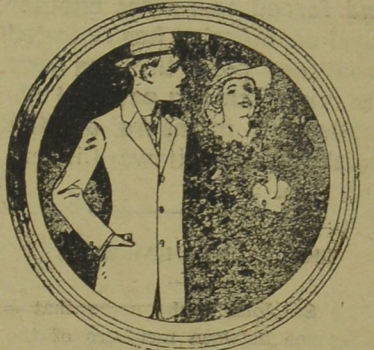
