FORMER FREDERICTON BOY TELLS WAR EXPERIENCES

Private William J. Robinson, Who Served With the British Expeditionary Force is Writing a Series of Articles For the Boston Globe.

Mr. William J. Robinson, formerly of this city, who recently returned from France after over a year of active service with the British expeditionary forces, is now at his home in Boston. He is suffering from an attack of rheumatism and has been granted leave of absence until spring.

Mr. Robinson is a son of the late Capt. Charles S. Robinson, of Hopewell Hill, Albert county, and a nephew of Mrs. R. P. Allen, of this city. His father died in Liverpool, Eng., about sixteen years ago and soon after, his mother removed to this city with her family, residing here for several years. She then removed to the United States and was for a time assistant pastor of a Baptist church in Vermont, and later held the position of home secretary of the Women's Baptist Missionary Board of New England.

Mr. Robinson has been engaged by the Boston Sunday Globe to write an account of his experiences at the front. The first instalment appeared on Sunday last and was prefaced by the following:

"Of all the men who have come back to America from the European war, probably none has had so varied experiences or seen so many kinds of service, traveled more over the British front in Northern France, than William Joseph (Billy) Robinson, a Boston youth who returned home two weeks ago after 408 actual fighting days without suffering any serious wounds.

"Robinson served in the British cavalry, carried thousands of dispatches along the front under fire on a motorcycle or on horseback, has driven the motors of many prominent English generals, captured three spies single-handed, was in both battles of Ypres, Hill 60, Neuve Chapelle, St. Julien, Potijze, Hooge, Loos and many other attacks, was detailed as one of the mounted escorts to King George during his visit to the front, and saw His Majesty's accident.

"Miraculous escapes from Jack Johnsons, shrapnel and rifle shell fire, droll and grewsome experiences and keen observations come from this young man in a most casual manner.

"Although 6 ft. 4 inches tall and of powerful build, young Mr. Robinson is of modest and retiring disposition, so that it was with some reluctance that he was induced to write for the Boston Globe some of his remarkable experiences. They are without equal in the adventures of any Boston youth who has been fighting in France."

Sketch of His Career.

William J. Robinson, whose unusual experiences in the great Euro-is a Boston boy. For the past fourteen years his family have resided in or around Boston. At the time he went abroad the last time his family resided in Roxbury, but since then they have moved to Everett.

Robinson was born 22 years ago on board an old sailing ship in the middle of the Indian Ocean, and was but three months old when he first saw land, Philadelphia. The first six years

"Of all the men who have come back of his life were spent on board his father's ship with his parents, and in that time they traveled around the world twice.

When 13 years old he entered Vermont Academy, Saxtons River, Vt., and graduated from there four years later. During that time his home was on Massachusetts ave., but afterward the family moved to Roxbury. Robinson was abroad on business when the war broke out, and later he joined the British army and was sent to Belgium with the expeditionary force. He has been on the firing line for over 18 months, covering each inch of the British front in France.

His last trip from Liverpool to New York makes his 23rd voyage across the Atlantic Ocean.

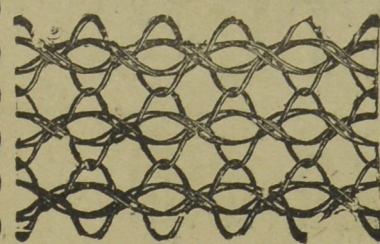
At the first camp visited four volunteers were secured and at another three. These men will come to Fredericton for medical examination.
