TO SET COLORS.

Some salt is especially effective in setting browns, blacks, pinks and reds, being used in proportion of two cupfuls of salt to one gallon of water. For blues, use vinegar in the proportion of half a cup of vinegar to one gallon of water. For lavenders, sugar of lead is often used, one tablespoonful of sugar of lead to one gallon of water. Sugar of lead is a poison and it should be handled with great care; throw out the solution as soon as used, wash the hands carefully.

Colored clothes should never be soaked. They should never be sprinkled, rolled for ironing and put in the basket with white ones, for in spite of "setting" the color may be a bit contagious.

Soap should never be rubbed directly on any colored piece. Make a solution of the proportion of one cake of pure white soap to two quarts of water, then to the warm water in which the clothes are to be washed add enough of

the solution to make a thick suds. Never boil colored clothes, and if possible wash one piece at a time.

TO WASH WHITE CORDUROY.

White corduroy is a favorite material for children's coats, and mothers are often anxious to know how to keep these tiny garments clean. Washing is the best process, the secret lying in the fact that the garment should be allowed to soak until the dust is out of it and should never be rubbed or ironed.

Make a warm, not hot, solution of soapsuds, to which, if necessary a small dash of ammonia may be added. Put the corduroy coat in, allow it to soak for one hour or more; then take it loosely in the hands and dip it in and out sufficiently to take out the dirt; then rinse with lukewarm water.

Don't wring it out, but simply press out what water you can with your hands, then hang the coat up to drip until dry. If it doesn't look smooth it can be lightly pressed on the wrong side with an iron that is not too hot.






