

SHOOTING OF SOLDIER WAS JUSTIFIED

Coroner's Jury at Kingston Exonerated
Man Who Fired Fatal
Shot.

Kingston, Ont., July 7.—The jury to-night returned a verdict to the effect that Gunner Russell Elliott came to his death as a result of being shot by Sentry Joseph West, in the discharge of his duties.

West was released from custody. The evidence produced showed that Elliott stood 20 feet away from the guard and refused to produce his late pass when ordered to do so by the sentry, and that the sentry, following outstanding instructions, fired at the ground.

BRITISH TROOPS MAKING PROGRESS IN THE WEST

Germans Launch Violent Counter Attacks
Which Are Successfully Repulsed---Ar-
tillery Duels in Several Sectors---Russian
War Office reports Important successes.

London, July 10.—The British troops have made "steady progress in the face of stubborn opposition" in the neighborhood of Ovillers, on the Somme front, according to the official statement from general headquarters last night. The German counter attacks near Bois de Trones were repulsed. The text of the statement reads:

"The hostile artillery was more active today. Artillery duels took place in several sectors.

"In the neighborhood of Ovillers, which incessant fighting has converted into a mass of ruined trenches, unrecognizable debris and shell holes full of mud, we again made steady progress in the face of stubborn opposition.

"In an attempt to retrieve to some extent the losses of the past week, the enemy this afternoon launched two violent counter attacks against our new positions in and near Trones wood (Bois de Trones). As in the case of his fruitless efforts yesterday, both attacks completely broke down under the effective fire of our guns."

Russians Make Gains.

Petrograd, July 9, via London.—Important gains by the Russians are announced in the War Office statement today. The announcement is as follows:

"Our offensive on the Lower Stokhod continues. The enemy is retreating in great disorder.

"South of the Sarny-Kovel railway, the villages of Goulevitchi and Kachova have been occupied after fighting. Further south there are fires everywhere in the region of the villages of Arenovitchi, Janocka and Douchth.

"In Southern Galicia, General Letchitsky occupied Delatyn yesterday after very violent fighting. Delatyn is a railway junction of great importance. Depots of war material, steel shields, cartridges, iron and wire, abandoned by the enemy, have been captured at many points.

"In the sector east and northeast of Baranovichi very lively fighting continues. The enemy is offering desperate resistance.

"In the Caucasus on the night of July 6-7, in the region south of the town of Platina, the Turks made attacks which were repulsed by our fire. West of Erzerum line we captured an entire line of fortified positions, taking prisoner 67 officers, two of whom were regimental commanders, and one of whom was a battery commander. We also captured 799 men, seven machine guns and one cannon."

Sir Sam Hughes Praises the Irish
Rangers Being Formed in
Montreal.

Ottawa, July 8.—"The Orange and Green are standing shoulder to shoulder in this war," observed General Sir Sam Hughes today.

The minister was alluding to an order he had just issued, permitting the Irish Rangers, of Montreal, to recruit anywhere in Quebec.

"There is a mistaken impression," he said, "that the regiment is composed entirely of Roman Catholics. This is not correct. There are lots of Protestants in it and the design is to make it a typically Irish regiment, and as I stated, with the Orange and Green blended. The Rangers are an exceptionally fine body of men."

BIG SHARK KILLS PHILADELPHIA MAN

Beach Haven, N. J., July 4.—Nothing ever more deeply shocked this section of the coast than the tragic death in the surf late Saturday of Charles E. Vansant, of Philadelphia, who was attacked by a nine foot shark as he was about to end a swim in the ocean.

The man-eater had been seen moving swiftly after the swimmer, and warning cries went up from those on the beach, but they came too late.

Mr. Vansant was less than 50 yards from the beach, and evidently failed to understand the meaning of the warnings, for he kept on swimming leisurely.

The shark made a dash, turned over with jaws open, and then closed them upon Vansant.

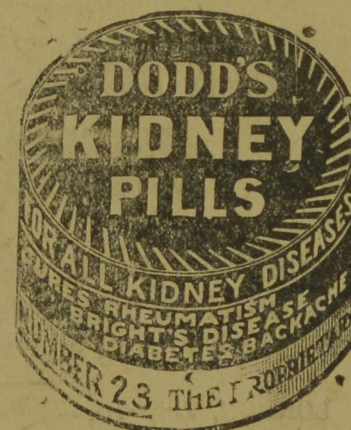
Help Was Too Late.

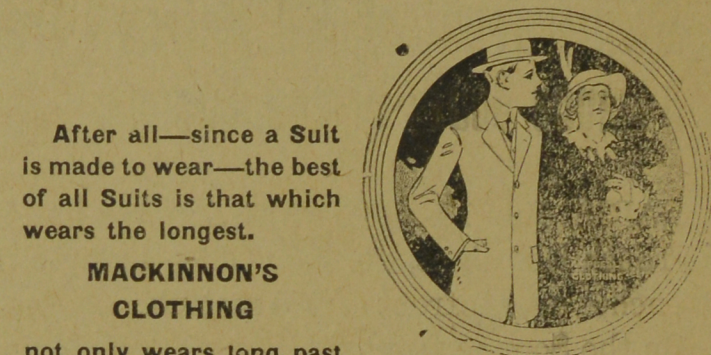
