A GERMAN SUBMARINE CROSSES THE ATLANTIC

Only Deviated From Course Once to Dodge

What Was Thought to be Enemy Craft

One outside the blockading lines and into the Atlantic, according to the captain's story, he headed straight across and only deviated from his course once when he saw what he took to be enemy craft.

Most of the time he sped along on the surface, making about 14 knots an hour with his powerful twin Diesel oil engines. Submerged he could go at the rate of 7 1/2 knots.

Approaching the capes late Saturday, Captain Koenig found his path apparently clear. He laid to with his decks awash, awash, however, waiting until darkness fell before nearing the coast. When the bright half moon went down shortly after midnight he put on all speed and shot between the Virginia capes, to be greeted by the tug Timmons, sent three more than a week before to await his coming.

On board the submarine are the captain, first and second officers and 26 men, all wearing the regulation uniforms of the German mercantile marine with the North German Lloyd insignia upon their caps. The skipper is a trim, slightly built man of around 40 years of age; two of his seamen are grizzled old tars, but the remainder are younger men.

JONES-CHALLENGER NUPTIALS THIS AFTERNOON

Sergt. James J. Jones and Miss Jane Challenger to Wed at St. Dunstan's.

Sergt. James J. Jones and Miss Jane Challenger, both of Fredericton, are to be married at St. Dunstan's Church at four o'clock this afternoon. Rev. Father Carhey will perform the ceremony.

The wedding will be a military one, the groom having recently returned from active service in France, where he was with the 10th Battalion. He will be in uniform.

The bride is to be given in marriage by Mr. Joseph McCarron. Miss Lillian Clark is bridesmaid and Mr. Thomas G. Powers groomsmen.

The bride will wear white duchess satin trimmed with shadow lace, with veil and orange blossoms, and will carry a bouquet of white carnations. Her bridesmaid is to wear royal blue with leghorn hat, and will carry a bouquet of pink carnations.

The groom's gift to the bride is a gold rosary, to the bridesmaid a gold bar pin, to the groomsmen a gold stick-pin and to Mr. McCarron a gold stick-pin set with pearls.

The ceremony is to be followed by a reception at the Victoria Hotel, on Queen Street West.

Sergt. and Mrs. Jones will leave tonight for Halifax, on their honeymoon. Sergt. Jones has been appointed recruiting clerk for Queens county, with his rank. He has been given a fortnight's leave of absence.

SIR ALEXANDER LACOSTE VISITING FREDERICTON

Former Chief Justice of Quebec--On Motoring Tour With Party.

Sir Alexander Lacoste, Mrs. Lacoste, Miss Lacoste and Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Beaubien, of Montreal, arrived in the city yesterday. They are on a motor tour and came from Quebec via Temiscouata and the St. John Valley. The ladies of the party will go to St. John tomorrow by steamer and the others by motor.

Sir Alexander is ex-Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Province of Quebec, having held the office from 1891 until 1907. He was prominent in politics some years ago, being identified with the Conservative party in Quebec. He served in the Dominion Senate from 1884 until 1891 and was Speaker when appointed Chief Justice of Quebec.

Sir Alexander is acquainted with Chief Justice McLeod of New Brunswick, and with members of the bar in Fredericton. He is visiting points of interest in and about the city today.

CAMPBELL CASE WAS DISMISSED BY MAGISTRATE

Police Magistrate Limerick on Saturday afternoon dismissed the case against Sam Campbell when he was charged on the information of Martin Kennedy with the theft of a sum of money. The case was dismissed on account of lack of evidence.

The defence stated that it would prove that Kennedy had accused several other persons of taking the money which he alleged was stolen.

The informant is an aged man who recently has been living at an Old Soldiers' Home in Maine. He is a veteran of the American Civil War, but during the greater part of his life has been a resident of New Brunswick. He came to Fredericton a short time ago and the day he said the theft took place drew upwards of five hundred dollars from the bank.

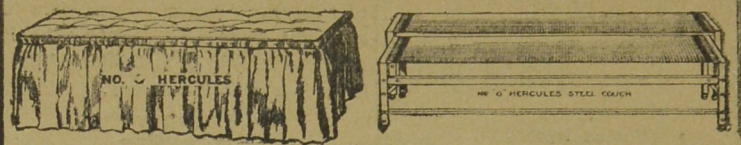
Department here being used. It is probable that this battalion will be here until next spring.
