HEAVY FIGHTING ON GALICIAN FRONT

Petrograd, July 8.—Artillery fire continues on the Galician front. On the Koropie river our troops continue to press back the enemy. West of Sadzaki we captured a position of the enemy and took prisoner some Germans.

South of Lake Narocz (south of the Dvinsk), the Germans made a fierce counter attack and re-conquered part of the trenches they lost yesterday.

East of Baranavichi, in the region of the village of Odchovitchina, the Germans pressed us back slightly as a result of a violent counter attack, but our concentrated fire compelled the Germans to withdraw.

In the Baranovichi region in the recent fighting, a machine gunner,

named Aloda, particularly distinguished himself. Although wounded in the head and bruised by splinters, he did not desert his post and inflicted enormous losses on the enemy.

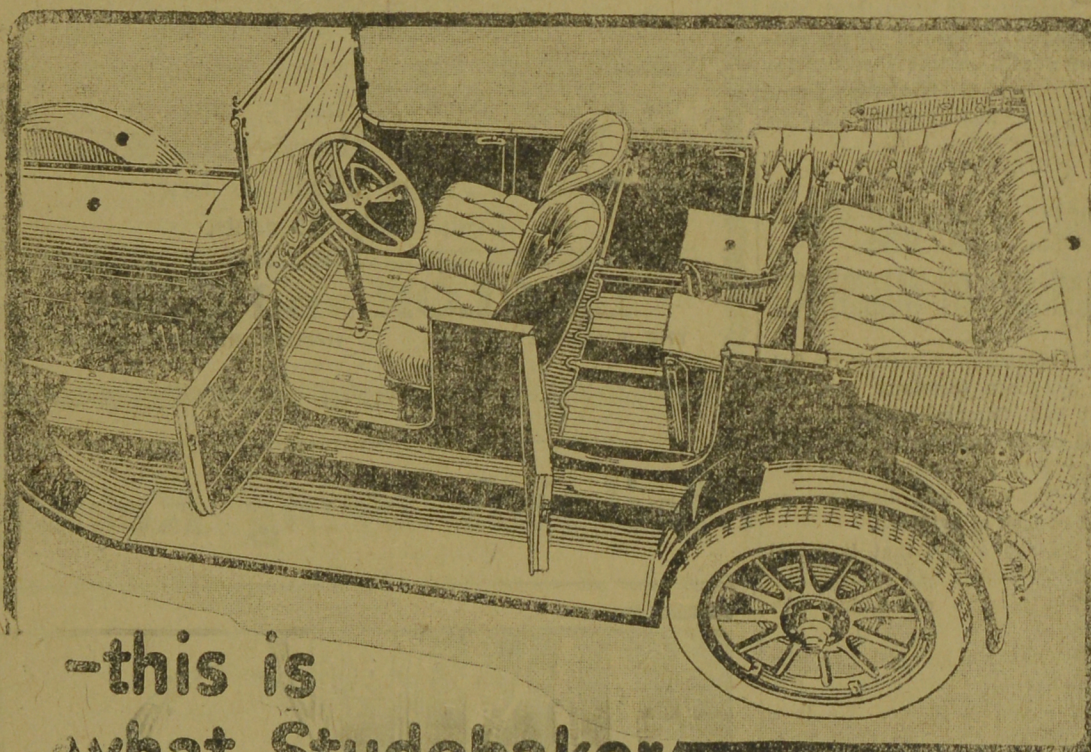

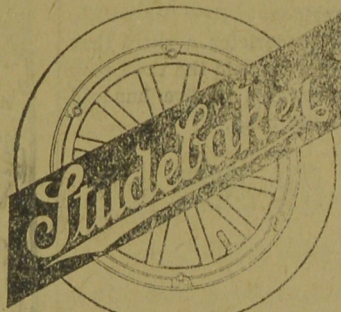
