## -Woman's Column-

### SOME NEW RECIPES.

#### Date Pie.

One pound and a half of dates stew-  
ed until soft and then strained through  
a colander, 3 eggs beaten light, 2 table-  
spoons of sugar, pinch of salt and add  
milk enough for 2 pies; bake in a hot  
oven and when cold put whipped cream  
on top.

#### Lemon Custard Pie.

Take 1 cup sugar, 1 heaping table-  
spoon flour which has been sifted, the  
grated rind and juice of 1 lemon, yolks  
of 2 eggs, pinch salt, 1 cup milk, beat  
into the mixture the stiffly beaten  
whites of 2 eggs, bake in one crust for  
half an hour.

#### Cheap Fruit Cake.

One half cup sugar, half cup molass-  
es, half cup shortening, two-thirds of  
a cup of buttermilk or sour milk, one  
teaspoon soda dissolved in the milk, 1  
egg, teaspoon of all kinds of spices,  
half teaspoonful ginger, 1 cup raisins,  
flour to mix until it hardly drops from  
the spoon, pinch of salt; bake rather  
slowly.

#### A Delicious Orange Cake.

Beat quarter of a cup of butter to a  
cream, gradually beat in a half cup of  
sugar, beat two eggs without separat-  
ing the whites and yolks, beat in half  
a cup of sugar and then beat the whole  
into the butter mixture. Add the grad-  
ed rind and juice of half an orange, add  
half a cup of milk and one and three-  
quarters of sifted flour sifted again with  
three level teaspoons of baking pow-  
der.

To make the frosting use the grated  
rind of one orange, one teaspoon of  
brandy, half a teaspoon of lemon juice,  
one tablespoon of orange juice, one  
egg yolk and confectioners' sugar. Add  
the rind to the brandy and fruit juice  
and let stand fifteen minutes. Strain  
and add gradually to the yolk of egg  
slightly beaten. Stir in confectioner's  
sugar until of the right consistency to  
spread.

### CLEANING PICTURES.

Benzine, naphtha and alcohol are  
best for cleaning the glass of pictures  
and do not require the care that water

does when used for this purpose. If  
the water leaks through some unseen  
crack or crevice and finds its way to  
the picture it will leave a stain or  
mark, while the three former will dry  
at once and leave no stain or mark at  
all, and at the same time they will be  
found to give the glass a brilliant  
polish without rubbing.
