

MR. DEWART DEALS WITH THE NICKEL QUESTION

Liberal Candidate in Southwest Toronto
Also Pays His Respects to Sir Sam
Hughes---Minister of Militia Must Ac-
cept Responsibility for Conduct of His
Friend Allison.

(Toronto Globe.)

An extraneous incident in the evening's address, an answer to the question put by an Englishman, "Do you think Sam Hughes is a rotter?" developed an interesting feature of Mr. H. Hartley Dewart's big gathering at the Zionist Institute on Saturday.

Mr. Dewart on Sam Hughes.

Mr. Dewart's answer was:
"I had a little experience with Sir Sam Hughes on the Small Arms Committee at Ottawa when he had the audacity to imply there was more honor in Allison's little finger than in the Auditor General's report, and when he said he would prefer to take Allison's word to Hartley Dewart's oath, so you know what I think. On another occasion he and I met and if you read the argument in that case, consider the fact that the Judge has kept that report in the pigeon-hole and has not yet published it—it may be because he does not desire to make now a report which would reflect so severely upon the conduct of the Minister, Sir Sam Hughes—you know what I think. It was at that trial that

dishonesty was brought home to Allison, whom he called his friend.

"Under those circumstances, I say the Minister must accept the fullest responsibility for the recommendation given to a man who ought not to have disgraced the politics of Canada; to a man whose exploitations in Canada and whose exploitations in the United States we have not been able to trace, but whom the Governor General by an order-in-council has deprived of his honorary military title (applause)—and in doing so passed his personal censure upon the character and conduct of the minister who has dared under such circumstances to support such a man." (Loud applause.)

How the "Coon Came Down."

Mr. Dewart in general reviewed the questions which, during the week, he remarked, he had "nailed to the masthead," nickel and the Hydro.

He touched on the opposition to his candidature of some Liberals of former time—"a little clique of the Liberal party that had been accustomed to pink teas." He remarked on the coincidence of that opposition with the fact

some of the Ministers from Queens Park had found it a convenient time to go to Europe. (Laughter.) In the short week that he had been before the riding the most cosmopolitan of the whole of Ontario, perhaps, he had "brought the coon down" a couple of branches, as shown by the apologetic attitude of three Ministers. But they would have to come farther. Many confessions that the Government was not all right had been made by the three Ministers, but they were not definite enough.

Many Promises to Get Votes.

"We have been told that there is to be a nickel refinery in the province. They do not say where, but they are holding out the promise like a will o' the wisp before the people everywhere. One day we hear that it is to be at Port Colborne, another day at Welland, and then at Hamilton, then it is shifted to Parry Sound, and it has even got as far north as North Bay.

"We are promised many things on the word of a gentleman whose chief claim to consideration and trust is that he suppressed the facts when a very notable commission was sitting, a gentleman, therefore, in whose word we cannot place the same confidence as otherwise."

Might Have Saved War Tax.

On the nickel question Mr. Dewart said that if the International Nickel Company had been taxed one-tenth of its earnings there would be no need for the Province to raise any other money for the war.

"No company was ever so lightly taxed by a government which honestly administered its affairs," he added, amid applause.

Mr. Dewart went on to say that there had been no answer to his challenge for Sir Adam Beck to go upon Mr. Norris' platform. If elected, he promised the people the same service that the corporations had always been ready to pay well for—and it was no

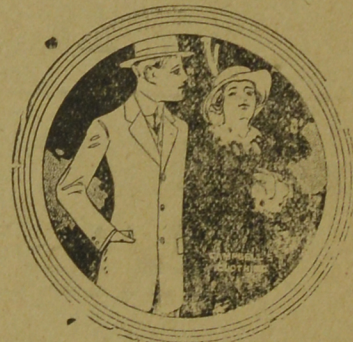
