A BIT OF HISTORY.

Speaking in the House of Lords a few days ago, Earl Grey, former Governor General of Canada, made mention of a report which had been current for several days that two United States destroyers had, at the request of the commander of the German submarine U-53, deliberately got out of the way in order to allow the submarine to destroy British ships off the American coast. Earl Grey was loth to nomination in Kinistino. credit such a report in view of the friendly relations which had always existed between the British and American navies. In this connection he gave the following version of an incident which had occurred during the battle of Manila Bay, at the time of the Spanish-American war:

"I hope that I may be permitted to quote one illustration of the way in which this spontaneous mutual service has had far-reaching effects in promoting good will between America and Britain. In 1905 I had the honor of meeting Admiral Dewey and some distinguished members of the American Senate at dinner in Washington. On that occasion Admiral Dewey narrated to me, in a voice and with gestures eloquently suggestive of the most gratetirely new to me, and perhaps new to some of your lordships here today-of the way in which he had received inchester at Manila at a time of great anxiety.
