CUSTOMS COLLECTIONS SHOW HEAVY INCREASE

First Seven Months of Year Show
Gain of \$16,500.

The amount collected in taxes upon
imports at the port of Fredericton was
much heavier this year than last, ac-
cording to the returns furnished by Mr.
L. C. Macnutt, Collector of Customs.
During the seven months ending with
October, the increase in duty was
about \$16,500. The month of October
showed an increase approaching \$3,000,
and an increase in value of imports of
\$19,000.

NEW TREATMENT HELPS WOUNDED

Paris, Oct. 23.—A system of steril-
izing wounds successfully applied at
the hospital at Compiegne under the
direction of Dr. Alexis Carrel, of New
York, Nobel prize winner, has been
extended to the American hospital at
Neuilly and will probably be adopted
in all the war hospitals of the Entente
Allies.

The process consists of a complete
irrigation of the wound by means of a
rubber tube with numerous branches,
perforated with many small holes. The
sterilizing solution was perfected after
experiments with 200 or more differ-
ent substances in various combina-
tions. The wound is rid of all foreign
substances and every corner or possi-
ble pocket is thoroughly cleansed.

The removal of muscles or bones
not irreparably injured is not practiced
on the first or second examinations as
frequently as before, and parts are
saved which might otherwise have
been lost.

Dr. Carrel says the duration of the
treatment is abridged about two-thirds
and the number of amputations dimi-
nished 50 p. c., and that in certain cases
complete healing occurs in one-tenth
the time required under ordinary treat-
ment.

"ASTOR" RUSSELL DIED SUDDENLY

Canadian, Texas, Oct. 31.—Charles
Taze Russell, known as "Pastor" Rus-
sell, an independent ministerial editor
of the Watch Tower, and prominent
author of studies on the scriptures,
died this afternoon on a passenger
train en route from Los Angeles to
New York. Heart disease was given
as the cause.

Pastor of Many Churches.

New York, Nov. 1.—"Pastor" Russell,
who died yesterday in Texas on a
train that was bringing him back to
his work in New York, stood for more
than a quarter of a century as unique
among the ministers of all creeds and
sects. He belonged to no denomina-
tion and attracted widespread atten-
tion through his varied activities and
methods of publicity.

He was pastor of churches all over
the country and travelled nearly 30,-
000 miles each year in pursuance of
his duties, but made his headquarters
at his Tabernacle in Brooklyn.

"Pastor" Russell started his career
as manager of a chain of furnishing
stores in Alleghany, Pa., but in 1878
he left this business and began to
preach.

tiff is not entitled to restrain the de-
fendant from using the present cor-
porate name, as that name was given
them by the Governor-in-Council un-
der the provisions of the Joint Stock
Companies' Act, and could only be taken
away by that same power.

The Chief Justice found as a fact,
however, that the use by the defend-
ants of their corporate name has led
to confusion.

The defendants were ordered to pay
the costs of the action.

The judgment was a very lengthy
one and occupied about an hour of time
to read.

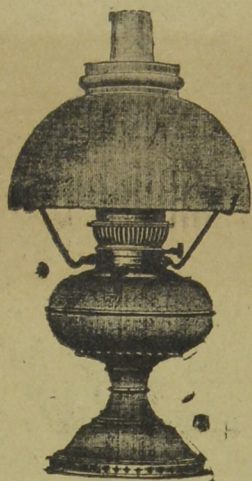
Appeal to be Made.

The defendant's solicitor stated that
the defendants desired to appeal, and
asked for a stay of proceedings, which
means a suspension of the injunction.
This application was opposed on be-
half of the plaintiff and was not al-
lowed, but it is understood that a further
application will be made to the court.

Ex-Ald. Crowe observed that he had
noticed no provision for dimming the
lights of cars.

Ald. McLellan replied that he had
not made any provision for that on ac-
count of difficulties in the way. The
owners of Ford cars or of cars having
certain lighting systems would be at a
heavy expense to provide lights which
could be toned down and yet would
give sufficient light by which to drive.

Mr. R. G. Lee gave instances of his
experience in the United States where
glaring lights were not permitted. In
some cases regulations were easily
complied with by covering the lenses
temporarily with varnish or some simi-
lar substance. The question of glar-
ing lights was important and should be
dealt with, he thought.

If necessary, a section dealing with
the lights of motor vehicles will be
added to the by-law.
