THE UNHOLY ALLIANCE.

Conservative newspapers would no doubt like to have the people forget about the unholy alliance formed between the leaders of their party and the Quebec Nationalists during the political campaign of 1911. The object of this allience was to down the Liberal government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and it accomplished its purpose, as the people of Canada now know to their cost. The Nationalist creed, which the Conservative leaders swallowed in 1911, was adopted at a gathering of Nationalists in 1903, which was presided over by Hon. E. L. Patenaude, now Minister of Inland Revenue in the Bor den cabinet. Here are four of the articles that he who runs may read: (a) No participation by Canada in

imperial wars outside of her territory. (b) To spurn any attempt at recruit ing for British troops.

(c) To oppose the establishment in Canada of a naval school with the help and for the benefit of the imperial authorities.

(d) Control over our militia and military colleges in time of war and in time of peace, and for the defence of our territory exclusively. Refusal to grant leave of absence to any militia officer in order that he may take part in an imperial war.

The above were the principal planks in the platform which Sir Robert Borden and the Conservative party adopt ed in 1911 when they made common cause with the Nationalists with the object of defeating the Liberals.


