Overeating is responsible for more illness (and death) than starvation. It is one of the most common errors of civilization. Hunger is satisfied with a limited quantity of plain food, but the taste seldom is satisfied till past the danger point if tempted with a great variety of changes.

To learn the difference between satisfying hunger and satisfying taste is the duty of everyone. One result of overeating is a tendency to severe colds, to hay fever and asthma. The blood becomes congested in the mucus membrane of the nose and throat, with these common and disagreeable ailments as a consequence. If a cold, hay fever or other similar disease has already set in, the food supply should be reduced below the actual needs, giving the body a chance to use up every atom of food that passes into the blood, and leaving no surplus to decompose and cause congestion.

ROUSING POLITICAL MEETING AT CENTREVILLE, N. B.

Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P., Gives an Account of His Stewardship Before a Large and Enthusiastic Gathering--Local Opposition Ready to Contest Any Constituency Which the Moribund Clarke-Baxter Government May See Fit to Open.

Centreville, June 22.—Friends of good government to the number of nearly 300 were present tonight at a public meeting in Sherwood's opera house.

Never perhaps in the history of political gatherings in this town has such a deep interest been manifest in matters pertaining to the condition of affairs in New Brunswick as was in evidence at this meeting. Men of all political leanings were present, and the deepest attention was given the speakers as the situation was placed before them.

Mr. Fred Tweedie presided and in a brief address said that a moral reform wave was sweeping over the country and already many grafters were down and out.

Andrew McCain, of Florenceville, in a short speech, spoke of the great debt due to F. B. Carvell in going into and exposing the graft and corruption so rampant in Canada.

Mr. Carvell's Speech.

Mr. Carvell, on rising to speak, was given a great reception. He held the close attention of the big audience for over an hour, going into the graft and scandals that exist both in provincial and federal politics. He said he was condemned by the Tory press for the part he had taken in the recent exposures, but he was doing his duty and every charge made had been proven to the hilt, as was evidenced by the retirement of several prominent politicians.

Referring to Mr. Flemming, he said the pity is that other men who profited by his misdeeds had not been brought to book.

"It is the rule," said Mr. Carvell, "that governments fill up vacancies as they occur. There are at present six in New Brunswick and no attempt is being made to fill these vacancies. There is a rumor that a Carleton county member was to be taken into the government and one purpose in coming here tonight was to notify the government that any man put up in this or any other county would be opposed. We have come to the conclusion that this government is not fit to rule this province and we will test it as we did in Westmorland. We have said those men are corrupt and if we are honest we will contest any county they may open."

Ready for Election.

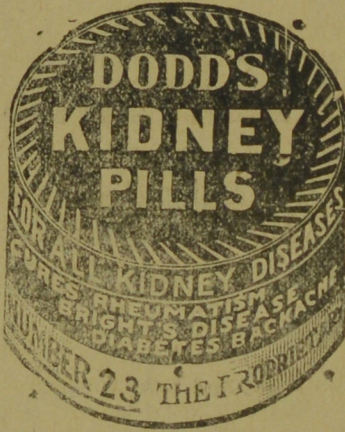
"Let them call on an election, and we will be ready to fight. Mr. Flem-

ming is not the only sinner. It seems to be quite proper, no matter how much they sin, to pay back money when caught, and thus expiate the offence. Mr. Flemming and Mr. Baxter returned certain amounts and B. F. Smith says he returned \$4,000 of the potato steal. If they got the money honestly, why did they give it back?"

Concluding an excellent speech, Mr. Carvell said there was a great awakening in Canada and the people would rise and put a stop to the graft and rascalities going on. He said 100,000 Conservatives in Canada were anxious to have honest government. The Westmorland election was won without a single dollar, which indicates the attitude of the people.

"The next election in Carleton," said the speaker, "will be honest on our side and I give notice that the other side will have to run it honestly—and we will see that it is done."

C. M. Sherwood moved that a vote of thanks be tendered Mr. Carvell for the great work he had done in this province and Canada in exposing the grafters and corruptionists. A meeting will be held tomorrow evening in Hartland when Mr. Carvell will again speak.

NEW YUAN SHI KAI WELL.

Dr. Goodnow Was Chinese Constitutional Adviser Two Years.

Dr. Frank J. Goodnow, president of Johns Hopkins University, knew Yuan Shi Kai the Chinese President, who died Monday, better than probably any other American, having served in Peking as his constitutional adviser for two years, and regarded him very highly.

"Probably more than any other of the old school Chinese," he said yesterday, "Yuan Shi Kai had a keen appreciation of the benefits that would come to China by the adoption of western methods. He received his education in China, never went to any foreign university and never learned any language but Chinese. He was a member of the old order."

"But when China went to war with Japan, its armies equipped with bows and arrows, and was badly beaten by Japan with its modern equipped army, Yuan Shi Kai appreciated that if China was to maintain its place it would have to adopt western methods, and he became an earnest advocate of them."

Asked how he managed to manage to become so powerful in China, Dr. Goodnow said Yuan Shi Kai was probably a better politician and more far seeing than any other man at the time he went into power. He was Viceroy of the province of Shantung at the time of the Boxer trouble and measured up to his responsibilities, saving the lives of many of the foreigners who were in danger.

It had been reported, Dr. Goodnow said, that Yuan Shi Kai was never much in favor of the establishment of a republic, but favored the continuance of the Manchu dynasty. He did not believe that the people of China, accustomed for centuries to an absolute monarchy, were fitted to take up the duties of citizens of a republic without some preparation.

He was considered at first to be extremely radical, but when the younger men came along with their advanced ideas he was regarded as an extreme conservative and a reactionary.

Dr. Goodnow did not believe Yuan Shi Kai was very keen for the restoration of the monarchy with himself on the throne, but felt that this was rather forced upon him.

ALLIES PLANNING

BIG OFFENSIVE

New York, June 22.—An offensive movement on a greater magnitude than anything heretofore attempted is under preparation by the British and French along the entire western front, according to Drs. J. S. O'Mally and F. C. Jacobs, of Chicago, recently connected with an American hospital corps in France, who arrived here today on the steamer Noordam, from Falmouth.

According to the physicians, this offensive was planned to begin in April, but was forestalled by the unexpected efforts of the Germans before Verdun. Evidence that the offensive movement is yet to take place, they said, is the vast quantities of munitions that are being gathered and stored in convenient localities, and the establishment of numerous hospital bases, fully equipped, back of the lines.

"The soldiers in the trenches were stunned by the news of Kitchener's death," Dr. O'Mally said. "Later, however, the feeling became one of gratitude that K. of K. had been spared to complete his great work—the building of the army which Great Britain has offered to the Allied cause."

FATAL ACCIDENT ON

THE MICHIGAN CENTRAL

Hagersville, Ont., June 22.—A fast special on the Michigan Central carrying General Sir Sam Hughes, struck a horse and buggy on the Tuscorora street crossing here about 4.30 yesterday afternoon, fatally injuring one occupant, William Brennan, and injuring George Morrow, the other. The horse was instantly killed and the buggy was demolished. Both victims were farmers.

Morrow escaped with two broken ribs and several scratches not considered serious.

Brennan sustained a severe fracture of the skull and a deep cut in the shoulder blade. He was unconscious when picked up by Morrow, and lived until about 8.30 in the evening.

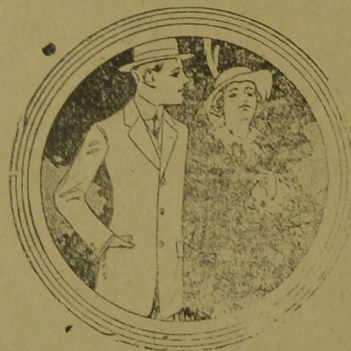
