MR. JOHN ANDERSON, EX-M. P. P., OF BARONY 95 YEARS OLD TODAY

Is in the Enjoyment of Good Health and Takes Daily Exercise in the Open Air--One of the World's Oldest Politicians--Has Had a Busy and Useful Life.

Mr. John Anderson, ex-M. P. P., of The Barony, York county, reached the ripe old age of ninety-five years today, having been born December 2nd, 1821. He is quietly celebrating the event at his home and has been the recipient of many congratulations from friends far and near.

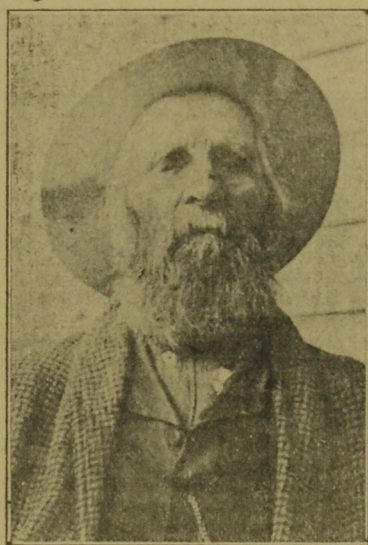
It falls to the lot of few men to reach the great age of ninety-five years and enjoy the blessing of mental and bodily vigor. Mr. Anderson is today in better health than was the case three years ago. He takes his meals regularly with the family, and takes daily exercise in the open air. He has long been an elder of the Presbyterian church and is a regular attendant at divine service. A year ago the St. John Presbytery honored him by adopting a resolution congratulating him on his great age and expressing thanks for his active interest in the welfare of the church.

Born in New Maryland.

Mr. Anderson was born in the Parish of New Maryland of Scottish parentage, and passed his boyhood days in that parish. He afterwards removed to Kingsclear, where he followed farming and lumbering. For the past fifty years he has made his home at The Barony and no man in that section of the county is better known and held in greater esteem.

In the Legislature.

Mr. Anderson is a lifelong Liberal and has always manifested a keen interest in public affairs. In the year 1890 he was elected to the Legislature as the colleague of the late Hon. A. G. Blair, then Premier and Attorney General, the late Hon. Richard Bellamy, and the present Judge Wilson. At a by-election which followed the filing of a protest against their election, Hon. Mr. Bellamy dropped out to accept a seat in the Legislative Council, and was succeeded by Mr. T. H. Colter, now registrar of deeds. They were opposed by a ticket called "The Big Four."

composed of the Hon. George J. Colter, Mr. Walter McFarlane, Mr. Geo. F. Gregory and Mr. W. K. Allen, all now deceased. After what was probably the bitterest political campaign in the history of York county, Hon. Mr. Blair and his three colleagues were returned by reduced majorities. In the general election of 1892 Mr. Blair's ticket was defeated on the Bathurst school question. Mr. Anderson was not afterwards a candidate for legislative honors, although he has ever manifested a keen interest in public affairs.

Oldest Free Mason.

Mr. Anderson claims to be one of the oldest Free Masons, if not the oldest, in the Dominion of Canada, having joined Hiram Lodge of this city seventy years ago. He is not now an active member of the Lodge.

Mr. Anderson became acquainted with hard work when quite a youth, and it was only a few years ago that the members of his family were able to persuade him to retire. For over fifty years he carried on extensive lumbering operations not only in various parts of this province, but in the State of Maine as well. Before the days of the Fredericton Boom Company it was customary for lumbermen to deliver their logs at the mills in St. John, and Mr. Anderson has piloted many a raft to that city. There were no railways in those days, and the return trip was made by steamer. When he was eighty-four years of age Mr. Anderson piloted a large raft of logs from The Barony to

Springhill.

Mr. Anderson's numerous friends throughout the province will be glad to know that he continues to enjoy excellent health and has strong hopes of being able to round out the century.

Canadians Given Prison Terms

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—A number of Canadians are included among British prisoners of war in Germany, who have been sentenced by the Huns to twelve years' imprisonment. The offence is not stated.

The affair came to light through a notification to the Red Cross society that food and comforts for prisoners could not be forwarded to those who were under conviction.

Efforts have been made to effect a reciprocal arrangement extending the same privilege to German prisoners of the Allies, but so far they have been unsuccessful. The military department has not been advised of the names or any information regarding the case.
