CANNOT CHARGE  
ADMISSION TO SEE  
WILLARD TRAIN

New York Boxing Commission With Order--  
Willard's Manager says  
will make no difference

New York, March 12—Regardless of the order of Fred A. Wenck, chairman of the Boxing Commission, in forbidding the charging of admission to see Jess Willard train, there will be little or no change in the daily routine of the champion, according to Tom Jones, his manager.

Jones declared tonight that Willard will be at the Pioneer Sporting Club at 2.30 tomorrow afternoon to go through his regular exercises. Jones further said that the doors will not be locked, nor will any attempts be made by him to keep out the curious. "I do not know whether or not admission will be charged," said Jones. "I do know that Willard will box at the Pioneer Sporting Club and I defy Wenck or anyone else to prevent it. I don't care a thing about Wenck or the authority he assumes. The only man I am interested in is Willard and I have his welfare so much at heart that I am ready to do anything to help him."

"It is up to Charles Doessereck, manager of the Pioneer Sporting Club, to say whether the crowd will be admitted or not. That is his business, not mine. He holds the boxing license and is the man responsible to the state."

Wenck says he will stand firm in his order against allowing admission to be charged.

Running true to schedule, Willard rested today. He took a short walk in the morning and rode about Central Park and the upper sections of the city in the afternoon. Frank Moran, unlike the champion, put in about the busiest day of his training period. He took a long jaunt in the morning, covering a lot of open territory at a jog trot, and was taking gymnastic exercises before luncheon.

GRAND CIRCUIT  
EARLY CLOSING  
ENTRIES TODAY

Horsemen in the United States Are Watching Situation with Interest--Season opens July 17.

Boston, March 13—The stake horses of the Grand Circuit will soon be brought into the limelight, as tomorrow entries must be made in the early closing events for the opening meeting of the chain at Cleveland July 17 to 22.

The Cleveland program does not contain a \$10,000 event, as the Forest City management has been very successful with \$3000. Cleveland provides well for the colt trotters, giving two races for three-year-olds and one for two-year-olds, all being under the sweepstakes plan, with \$500 added money in every event.

The announcement of the Ohio entry will be awaited with considerable interest because followers of the line are anxious to learn how many owners are willing to try against Peter Mac, the stallion that Capt. David Shaw recently refused to part with for \$68,000. Then others want to know how the "Devereaux purse" is going to be supported.

The circuit from Cleveland to Atlanta is pledged to give an early closing purse for trotters that have never won \$2000 or more gross, nor have a time or race record faster than 2:14. This event at Cleveland has been named the "Tavern Steak," taking the place of the Dollar entrance race for amateur drivers, which was a tremendous hit in its first two years.

## LINE ON WHAT TO EXPECT.

Cleveland, however, gives as much money for this race as for any other, so its entry may be a fair line on what is to be expected at the later meeting. Turfmen are, however, curious to find out how the plan is going to work out under the most favorable conditions, which are those offered at the home of its inception.



"Why, I never heard of such a thing," said John. "The idea of getting quotations from a doctor; it's the asylum for you."


