URGES ADVERTISING IN THE NEWSPAPERS

Philadelphia, April 14.—A. R. Find-
lay, editor of a New York trade paper,
told the members of the Poor Richard
Club here this afternoon at a luncheon
that bright newspaper advertising is
doing more than anything else to over-
come the impression prevalent through-
out the whole country that Philadelphia is
a sleepy city.

"Your advertisements are not only
attractive, but convincing," said Mr.
Findlay. "They are helping more
than anything I know of to do away
with the idea that Philadelphia is som-
nolent. It is a fine thing to tell the
people of other cities through news-
paper and periodical advertising what
you are doing in the commercial and
industrial line. You gentlemen are
making your advertisements tell the
story of your business. It is this kind
of advertising that interests people of
other cities and makes them sit up
and take notice."

Mr. Findlay concluded his address
by advising the members against dis-
continuing their advertisements when
business is good.

"Advertising is business insurance,"
he said. "You must advertise to get
business and then advertise to keep
it. I know a man who puts an expen-
sive advertisement in a paper at a
time when his factory is going full
force. Why does he do it? Because
he can see depression coming. He is
far sighted and knows how to prepare
for dull times. By inserting that ad-
vertisement he gets enough orders ahead to keep
him busy all through the dull period."
