City Clerk what the meeting was called for.

Acting City Clerk Perkins—"The object of the meeting is stated in the notice just as you said, 'to receive reports.'"

Mayor Mitchell—"Perhaps we had better find out who is running the Council."

Ald. Reid—"Yes, I guess we had better."

The order of business was then taken up.

Ald. McLellan Reports.

Ald. McLellan proceeded to report upon the visit of City Engineer McKnight and himself to Montreal and Ottawa. He referred to a former meeting of the City Council at which the Filtration Plant was discussed and said that a large filtration plant in Montreal had been visited. He had given out no information concerning this matter. He realized that the chairman of the Water Committee was having a hard time with the officials on account of the inefficiency of the plant.

Ald. McLellan then began to read a report of City Engineer McKnight, dated November 27th. The report stated that it was based on records and that there was no intention to cast reflection on the chairman of the Water Committee. It was realized, however, that the chairman was seriously handicapped by lack of harmony among the members of the Water Works staff, which was a grave menace to the work and efficiency of the department. The despotism of the Chief Engineer of the Pumping Station was the cause of much of this.

Mayor Holds Report Up.

At this juncture Mayor Mitchell interrupted Ald. McLellan, stating that a report of that nature should go to the Water Committee.

Ald. Everett, chairman of the Water Committee, stated that he had no request to make with regard to this matter. Had he had an opportunity to read that report he might have been ready to submit to the Council. It would have been merely an act of courtesy not to have submitted that report to the City Council before it had been considered by the Water Com-

mittee.

Ald. Lemont—"I cannot see that Ald. McLellan had any thing to do with the Water Department, and I am surprised to see such a report presented by him. I cannot see how it comes to be in his possession. Surely an apology is due the Water Committee. I move that the report be referred to the Water Committee."

Ald. McLellan Takes Issue.

Ald. McLellan seconded the motion. He took issue with the remarks of the mover. He merely had intended to hand this report over to the general committee. He had read the report with interest.

Ald. Burnett—"I read that report with great interest. I do not see why a technicality should be introduced and this report sent to the Water Committee merely to come back."

Ald. McLellan—"I want it understood that I came here merely to hand that report over to the committee."

Mayor Mitchell—"You told me you wished to report on the City Engineer's trip away, particularly on roads and streets."

Ald. McLellan—"I did not specify that. I meant anything that might have come to his attention."

Water Committee Retires.

Ald. Everett—"As that report has been referred to the Water Committee, I move that the committee retire, consider the report, and make our report to the Council."

The motion was adopted and the Water Committee retired.

After the committee returned, Ald. Everett reported that the committee had decided that it would not be fair to either the City Engineer or the Chief Engineer at the Pumping Station to present the report to the City Council without further consideration. The Water Committee intended to have both engineers before it, and to report at the next meeting.

Ald. McLellan asked if the report was to be ready for the next meeting.

Ald. Everett replied that it probably would be ready before that time, as the committee would meet Tuesday night.

The Council then adjourned.
