LITTLE PROGRESS IN SETTLING STRIKE

New York, July 19.—The breaking off of conferences between the Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturers' Protective Association and the International Garment Workers' Union, left the garment workers' strike today to all intents and purposes where it was when it started three months ago.

Statements issued by both sides accused the other of bad faith and responsibility for the failure.

The strike affects some 40,000 employees and about 500 manufacturers.

BIG PROPERTY LOSS IN THE CAROLINAS

Asheville, N. C., July 19.—Flood waters in the Carolinas and parts of adjacent states were rapidly receding today, leaving in their wake a property loss variously estimated at from \$12,000,000 to \$15,000,000 and a list of deaths from drowning that has steadily increased since the waters rose Sunday.

Today the toll of human life stood at 34, with prospects that it might be increased still further.

A VALUABLE CARGO.

New York, July 18.—The Cupard liner Saxonia arrived here last night from Liverpool, carrying \$20,000,000 in specie and securities consigned to J. P. Morgan & Co. by the Bank of England.

BUGLERS FOR 236TH SELECTED AT ST. JOHN

Reformation Scheme to be Tried—
One Recruit Enlisted Here.

Albert Clinton Regan, of St. John, enlisted here this morning for the pipe band of the 236th Highlanders. He will go in barracks here.

Lieut. Col. P. A. Guthrie, officer commanding that battalion, is making an experiment in reformation of juvenile delinquents. Frank Smith, of this city, one of the so called "boy bandits," who committed depredations in and about Fredericton during last spring, has been released from the St. John jail on Col. Guthrie's representations and will join the battalion as a bugler. Another boy, named Dickinson, who deserted from the 69th French Canadian Battalion, has also been released from St. John jail for the same purpose.

Col. Guthrie has also selected eight boys from the Boys' Industrial Home in St. John, to become drummers and buglers.

Three recruits from No. 1 Construction Corps, John Conroy, G. B. Beaurecraft, and F. Garant, were forwarded to St. John today.

Lieut. Col. Guthrie is accompanying Major General Benson today on his tour of inspection at St. Andrews.

CANADIANS IN KHAKI NUMBER 350,000

Ottawa, July 19.—Over 350,000 out of the total authorized establishment of half a million have so far enlisted in Canada.

Enrollments in the past fortnight—up to July 15th—number 4,749.

By divisions, the enlistments in the fortnight were: No. 1, London, 279; No. 2, Toronto, 1,244; No. 3, Kingston-Ottawa, 510; No. 4, Montreal, 538; No. 5, Quebec, 89; No. 6, Maritime Provinces, 172; No. 10, Manitoba and Saskatchewan, 706; No. 11, British Columbia, 652; No. 13, Alberta, 559.

A HEAVY TAX ON SHIPPING CONCERNS

London, July 19.—Announcement was made in the House of Commons today by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Reginald McKenna, that the government had decided to take in taxation 70 per cent. of the excess profits of shipping firms.

ACTIVITY IN ALBANIA

Berlin, July 19 (via wireless to Sayville).—Revival of activity in Albania, where the military situation has been virtually unchanged for months, is reported in the official Austro-Hungarian statement of July 16.
