

MAY RESUME SUBMARINE WARFARE

Signs Point to a New Decision on
The Subject in Germany Before
a Great While.

Berlin, July 18 (via London).—The active campaign for resumption of submarine warfare in its previous form has assumed new importance from an article today by Eugene Zimmerman, general director of the Lokai Anzeiger, whose views, as past events have shown, usually reflect the opinions held in governmental circles.

Referring to the reasons which Great Britain gave for abandoning the declaration of London, Herr Zimmerman contemplates the possibility that Great Britain will compel smaller neutral states to adopt an unfriendly, perhaps a hostile attitude towards the Central Powers, or even to close their frontiers completely against them.

He then cites in heavy type his own comment on Germany's acceptance of the American demands in regard to submarine warfare indicating that circumstances might arise later which would make it impossible to adhere to the restrictions on the activity of these craft.

Herr Zimmerman intimates in valid manner, being unable to discuss this phase more freely, that the submarine power of Germany has undergone a favorable change since spring, evidently meaning that either their numbers or their efficiency have been increased considerably.

He concludes his article with the assertion that all signs indicate a new decision on the submarine question will be necessary very soon.

LIVING COST DOWN IN 1915.

Bureau of Labor Makes Prices of 29 Articles 1 per cent. Lower Than in 1914.

Washington, July 12.—The cost of living, after rising steadily since 1907, except in 1911, took a downward turn during 1915. A report by the Bureau of Labor issued today analyzing the retail prices of 29 articles of food, shows that relative prices in 1915 averaged 1 per cent. lower than in 1914.

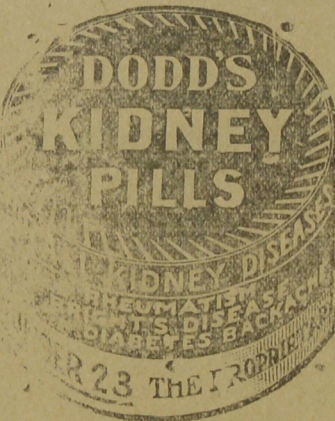
Meats, lard and eggs averaged from 1 to 9 per cent. lower, while potatoes were 22 per cent. lower. Wheat flour, cornmeal and sugar were higher than in 1914, flour being 20 per cent. and sugar 11 per cent. higher.

Commenting on statements that the European war is the dominating influence now controlling price changes of all commodities, the report says:

"It is true that retail food prices increased greatly immediately after the outbreak of the war, and it seems probable that they have been maintained at a higher level ever since as a consequence of increased demand abroad for our foodstuffs. A study of the retail price statistics of the bureau, however, will convince anyone that with the exception of flour, sugar and possibly cornmeal, the prices of the principal articles of food since October, 1914, have been mainly governed by local and seasonal conditions and not by extraordinary exigencies brought about by the war.

"The price of sugar shot up 52 per cent. from July 15 to Aug. 15, 1914. The elimination of beet sugar coming from Germany, Austria and Russia from the American sugar market, has kept sugar prices high. While flour did not jump in price so spectacularly as sugar, the cutting down of the area devoted to wheat growing in Western Europe and the cutting off of Russian wheat from Western Europe, resulting from the war, have so increased the demand for American wheat and flour that flour prices have advanced even more than sugar.

"Beef prices increased suddenly at the beginning of the war, but soon fell and have since behaved normally."

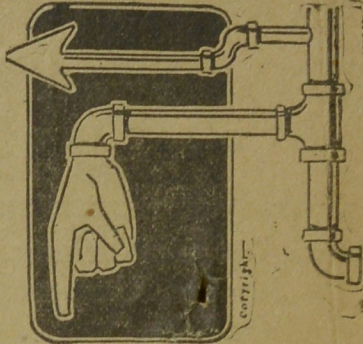

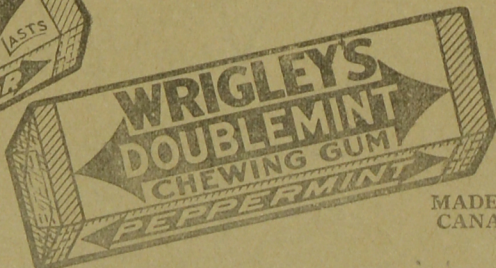
