DENOUNCES ORDER-IN-COUNCIL TO REGULATE FOOD PRICES

Mr. E.M. Trowern of Ottawa Speaks Before Local, Retail Merchants Association-- Says Merchants are Not Getting Square Deal From the Government.

A special meeting of the members of the Fredericton Branch of The Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, was held last night in the Board of Trade rooms to hear addresses from Mr. E. M. Trowern, of Ottawa, secretary of the Dominion Board of the Association, and Mr. Robt. Reid, of St. John, secretary of the New Brunswick Board. These officials are making a tour of the province for the purpose of laying before the Retail Merchants some important matters that the Association is now taking up, and also for the purpose of increasing the membership of the Province.

The meeting, which was well attended, was presided over by Mr. A. Murray, the president of the local branch. Secretary Reid.

Mr. Reid explained the progress of the work of the Association throughout the province, and strongly urged that active steps be taken to protect the retail merchants, who are the largest tax payers in every municipality, from having to compete with transient traders and other persons who pay no license or taxation of any sort.

Mr. E. M. Trowern pointed out the important position that retail merchants occupy in the community, and stated that there was one hundred times more money invested in merchandise and in its retail distribution than was invested in either manufac-

turing or production.

Class Legislation.

He strongly condemned the recent order which was passed by the members of the Dominion cabinet at Ottawa to endeavor to prevent the enhancement of the cost of commodities.

He stated that the Government, by excluding the farmers and the market gardeners and the laboring and professional classes, and including retail and wholesale merchants, was creating class legislation and insinuating that the retail and wholesale merchants were guilty of increasing prices and other classes were innocent.

If any legislation were necessary, every class should be included, and no one should be exempt. He considered the legislation unfair and unjust, and one of the worst pieces of class legislation that had ever been adopted in Canada, and had it come before the members of the House of Commons and the Senate it never would have been made law, but as it was passed in council as a war measure, neither the public nor the retail merchants had any opportunity of opposing it. He advised every retail merchant to protest against its discriminating provisions and to resent the insult that has been placed on the retail trade by its enactment.

The meeting unanimously endorsed the action of the Dominion Board, who are protesting against the measure.

HUN PIRATICAL POLICY AGAIN IN FULL SWING

Announcement of the torpedoing of seventeen vessels by Hun U boats was made yesterday at London, and another, the Ernaston, previously reported sunk, has arrived safely in port, but badly damaged by a torpedo.

Among the number is the United States steamer Chemung, which went to the bottom with Stars and Stripes at the masthead, the captain having refused to lower it after an altercation with the German raider.

The toll of the pirates included two sailing vessels, the rest steamers. Of the number six were neutral ships, two Greek, three Norwegian and one United States. A Danish vessel was seized by the Germans and taken into a home port.

Braemar Castle was Torpedoed.
Washington, Nov. 28.—The Lloyd's report received late today at the State Department lists the hospital ship Braemar Castle as torpedoed. It also reports the torpedoing of the Norwegian steamer Banstead on Nov. 23, and the sinking of the Norwegian steamer Oitjel and Tryn and the British steamers Emlinderne and Jerseyman. Dates were not given.

U. S. Steamer Sunk.
London, Nov. 28.—Lloyd's reports that the American steamer Chemung has been sunk. She was owned by the Harby Steamship Co. of New York, was built at Buffalo in 1888, was 327 feet long and 3662 tons gross.

With U. S. Flag Flying.
The crew of the Chemung have been landed at Valencia by the Spanish steamer Giner, says a despatch.

The Chemung was torpedoed near Cabo de Gata, and foundered with the

HUGE BEAVER DAM.

While inspecting the work of these wonderful animals, a buck deer came in sight and was killed by Dr. Morehouse. Later he and the guide each killed a caribou.

Parliament Buildings, Ottawa.

The Joint Committee on the Reconstruction of the Parliament Buildings desire to use Canadian Stone for the interior finish of the corridors and chambers, provided it can be obtained in proper dimensions and of suitable quality, texture and color, and at fair and proper prices, and delivery made within a reasonable time.

Prices and samples of sandstone, marble, limestone and granite will be received by the undersigned until 4 p. m. December 5th, 1916.

About 150,000 cubic feet more or less of stone is required for the interior lining of the corridors, lobbies, chambers, etc. A stone that is light in color, either light grey or buff, will be preferred, medium to fine grained in texture, uniform in color and free from veins, iron stains, vents and other defects of this nature.

Give description of the quarry, and state the thickness of beds and dimensions of the stone that can be supplied. Submit a three inch by three inch by five inch sample, and state price per cubic foot delivered f.o.b. Ottawa; also the date on which delivery can be commenced and the number of cubic feet that can be supplied per month.

NEARING \$32,000.
