### OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

#### RECIPES WORTH TRYING.

##### Apple Dumplings.

One pint of flour, one heaping teaspoon baking powder, one-half teaspoon salt, piece of butter the size of an egg, add enough sweet milk to roll out. Cut in squares and fill with sliced apple, fold and place in baking tin. Take three-quarters cup sugar, fill with boiling water. Add a small piece of butter, pour over the dumpling and bake one-half hour in hot oven.

##### Chocolate Filling for Cake.

Melt 11-2 squares of chocolate (unsweetened) over hot water; add 1-2 cup of scalded cream or milk gradually, few grains of salt, yolk of 1 egg and 1-2 a teaspoonful melted butter. Stir in confectioners' sugar until of right consistency to spread, then add teaspoon of vanilla.

If you prefer, above ingredients may be added to boiled sugar as usual in making frostings.

##### Chocolate Mousse.

Two squares chocolate, 1-2 cup powdered sugar, 1 cup cream, 3-4 tablespoon granulated gelatin, 3 tablespoons boiling water, 3-4 cup

sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 quart cream. Melt chocolate, add powdered sugar and gradually 1 cup cream. Stir over fire until boiling point is reached, then add gelatin dissolved in boiling water, sugar and vanilla. Strain mixture into a bowl, set in a pan of ice water, stir constantly until mixture begins to thicken, then fold in the whip from remaining cream. Mold, pack in salt and ice and let stand four hours.

##### Cheese Ramekins.

Stale bread, 2 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon paprika, 2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup grated cheese. Cut the bread into slices about one and one-half inches thick, then cut out in rounds the size of the ramekin used. Beat the egg slightly, add salt and paprika, then the milk. Strain this mixture over the bread in the ramekins until the bread has absorbed all of the mixture that it can. Dot the top with bits of butter, then cover with a layer of grated cheese, about one-half inch thick, and sprinkle lightly with paprika. Place in a moderate oven and cook until the custard has "set" and the cheese has melted. Serve very hot.

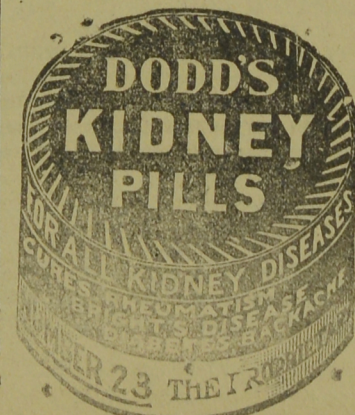

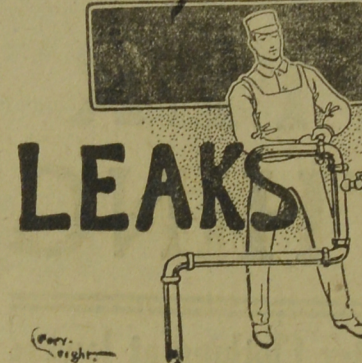
