

He declared, for instance, that individuals who stand at their work, such as bakers, dentists. car conductors, decorators and glass were short but were cheered to the workers, require about 3,000 calories. echo. Dr. Smith was cordial in his If muscular labor be constant, more is required. The latter applies to the worker who is able to earn on an average from \$10 to \$14 a week.

The New York Health Department, E. S. Carter told the crowd that all in giving its figures of \$7.31, brings Canada was waiting for the result in down the cost to \$1.06 per day for five, Westmorland, and the good old county making an average of a little more than 20c. for each person.

Compare this with the statistics furnished by Dr. Mahoney.


Based on what one person could consume at a meal, the cost is as follows: 91/2 ounces of steak, 17.38 cents; slices of bread, .45 cents; 10 gms. of butter, .89 cents; 21/2 oz. potatoes, .04 cents, ar a total of 18.68 cents actual cost, where the greatest economy in purchasing power is practiced. The above also represents a cost of 55c. in a restaurant

The above also represents only a caloric value of 1,300 and is but one meal. Three times the above, to get the full value of calories, would mean 58 cents worth of food and a little more than 3,000 calories, thus showing at once that the \$7.31 would be insufficient to meet the requirements of feeding five persons, be they adults or minors.

About the only food that would give the calories and come within the amount specified by the New York Health Department would be peanuts and water


