GREAT INTEREST IN WESTMORLAND BY-ELECTION

Telephones Kept Busy Last Night--
Result Caused General
Satisfaction.

The word from the Westmorland by-
election last evening was received
with eagerness by people of Frederic-
ton and vicinity.

The news that Dr. E. A. Smith, the
opposition candidate, was leading at
the first polls which gave returns, caus-
ed great pleasure, and the later news
that his election was assured, increas-
ed it.

The Mail's bulletin board was watch-
ed closely and the telephone was kept
ringing constantly by those in the city
and outside who were desirous of learn-
ing what was the result of the elec-
tion. There were varying reports at
different times, but all gave the infor-
mation that Smith was leading.

Former supporters of the Provincial
Government received word of the Gov-
ernment candidate's defeat with satis-
faction, and they, with the supporters
of the Opposition, recognized the de-
feat of Hon. P. G. Mahoney, Minister
of Public Works, as the beginning of
the end of the present regime in prov-
incial politics.

It is expected that the rump of a
government will meet here in the
course of a few days to consider the
situation. It is not known what course
will be decided on, but if Premier
Clarke has any say in the matter there
will be no hasty action. The Premier
took no part in the Westmorland con-
test, and will therefore be quite willing
to let Baxter and Murray take all the
blame for the result.

Will Not Sell Booze to Soldiers

Kingston, Ont., May 31.—The hotel
keepers of this city held a meeting
yesterday and agreed not to sell or
supply liquor to any soldier in uni-
form, except beer and soft drinks, from
this date to the end of the year.
They also went a step further in
agreeing that they would not sell
whiskey to any person after 6 p.m.

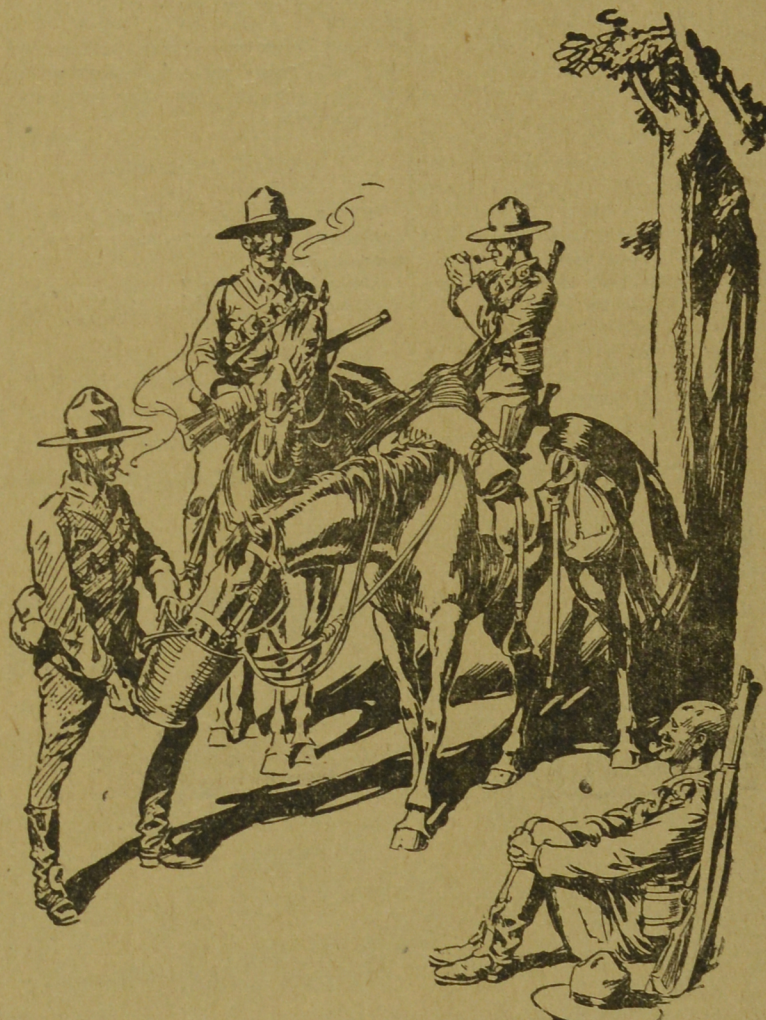
