"I? Oh, I shall be all right."

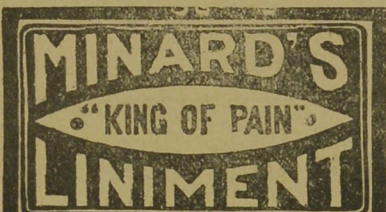
Barnes rose.
