FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Finance Committee of the City Council met last night and considered the matter of collecting taxes which are in arrears. The same methods employed last year will be used this.

GOOD GROWING WEATHER.

Thomas Marshall and interment was made at the Rural cemetery. The funeral was largely attended, many friends taking the last opportunity of paying a tribute of respect.

SUCCESSFUL CONCERT.

The 104th Battalion Band gave a very successful concert in Pryor's Hall, Marysville, last night. The seating capacity was taxed to the utmost and the band received a hearty reception. During the evening Lt. Col. W. H. Gray delivered an address, in which he spoke highly of the band and asked for recruits. Three Marysville men have volunteered to join.

IN HOSPITAL AGAIN.

Chief of Police McCollom has received an official telegram from Ottawa notifying him that his brother, Private Ernest McCollom, of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, has been admitted to hospital suffering from shell shock. This is the fourth time Private McCollom has been in hospital. On previous occasions the causes were wounds from barbed wire, general exhaustion and gas effects.

There are two sisters, Mrs. James Essensa of Newmarket, and Mrs. Janet Souci of Myshrali Settlement, also one brother, Dominick Goodine of Hanwell. The funeral will take place Thursday morning, leaving the house at 7.50. High Mass will be celebrated at St. Dunstan's church by Rev. Father Carney. The remains will be taken to Hanwell for interment.

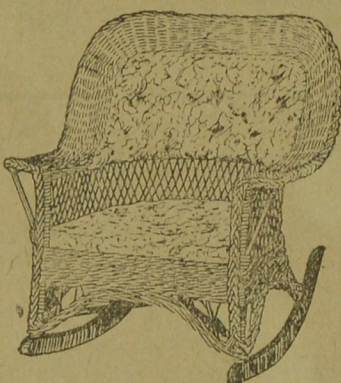
