RACE-TRACK VETERAN  
WON AT MEDFORD

His Bay Mare Lucky Clover Won 2.20 Class—Nuf Axworthy Won Matched Race.

Medford, May 30—A large crowd witnessed the three events at Combination Park half-mile track this afternoon.

Lucky Clover, a bay mare, pacing, owned and driven by the veteran Frank P. Fox of South Medford, won the 2.20 class mixed race in four heats over the favorite, Little Gellig, a bay trotting gelding, owned by H. J. Foster.

The Clover horse won the first heat by a bare couple of lengths in 2:19, the fastest mile of the races, but lost the second because of breaking a back strap.

Cristo took this heat from Little Gellig. The third and fourth miles were close drives, but Lucky Clover came through in both.

J. F. Kingsley's Emma G., a brown trotting mare, won handily in three straight miles in the 2:30 class trotting event.

Nuf Axworthy came home second in the initial heat of the half-mile special, but came back strong in the second and third heats and cleaned up the honors.

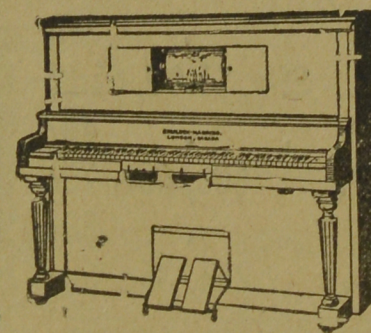

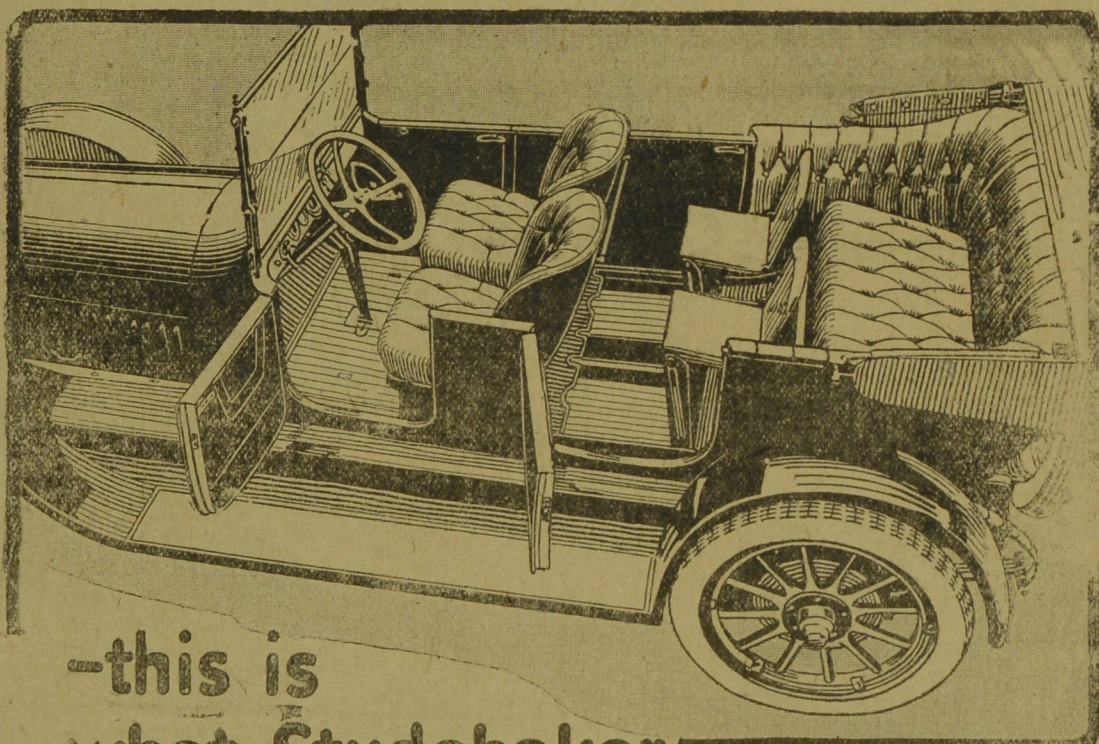
