RUSSIANS OCCUPY VILLAGES.

PETROGRAD, July 7, via London, July 8.—Following up their advance in the region of the Lower Sty, the Russians have occupied two villages and a railway station. The War Office today says that the villages of Komarow and Grady, and the railway station of Manevitchi are now in Russian hands. These three points are in the region to the west of Czartorysk, where there has been violent fighting for several days, the Germans having thrown in heavy reinforcements to check the Russian advance toward the important strategic position of Kovel. The Manevitchi station is 14 miles west of Czartorysk. Komarow and Grady are southwest of Czartorysk. A German retirement in this region was announced in Berlin today.

MAY NOT INCREASE THEIR FREIGHT RATES

Government Railways Not Subject to The Jurisdiction of the Railway Commission.

Ottawa, July 8.—The government system of railways, not being subject to the jurisdiction of the Railway Commission, may or may not avail themselves of the authorized increase of rates on the other railways, and bring up their schedules correspondingly.

The situation is a peculiar one in that the state owned road rates are lower than the others, while the disparity will be more marked than ever now that the railway board justifies increases in Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk and Canadian Northern tariffs.

F. P. Gutelius, General Manager of Government Railways, returning from Winnipeg, is to spend the week end in Ottawa, when the situation will be discussed with the Minister of Railways and afterwards considered by the government.

It is not thought that there is any great likelihood of the rates being raised to the authorized scale of other corporations.

Recruiting Gatherings.

Lieut. Col. W. H. Gray has completed arrangements for recruiting gatherings at Chipman and Fredericton Junction in connection with Orange celebrations there on Wednesday, July 12. Recruiting clerks will be present at both gatherings. Col. Gray and Major Gégge, medical officer of the 236th Highlanders, will be at Fredericton Junction on that day. Arrangements for other speakers are being made.

Around the Market.

There was a fair sized market this morning and fair prices prevailed. Butter sold at 25c., eggs at 28c., potatoes at \$3, veal at 8 and 10 cts., lamb at \$1.25 and \$1.50 per quarter, fowl at \$1.25 per pair, and strawberries at 15c. per box.

Mrs. Mary Ann Mitchell, widow of the late John H. Mitchell, passed away yesterday at her home, Lincoln, after a short illness with heart disease. The deceased was eighty-six years old. One sister, Miss Hannah Lipsett, survives, also two sons, George W. Mitchell, of Lincoln, with whom she resided, and C. Wesley Mitchell, at home, and one daughter, Miss Elizabeth Mitchell. The funeral will take place Sunday, Rev. Mr. Boothroyd conducting the service. Interment will be made at Lincoln.

INAUGURATION OF ELECTRIC LIGHTING IS CELEBRATED

Marysville People Held Gathering Last Night--Speeches Made

INAUGURATION....

Marysville, July 8.—The inauguration of the electric lighting service furnished to the town and its residents from the plant of the Canadian Cottons, Limited, was fittingly observed here last night.

The lawn of Mr. Joseph Dolphin's residence was decorated with flags, bunting and incandescent lamps. The bandstand also was illuminated.

Tables were set upon the lawn and refreshments were served under the direction of a committee of ladies.

The Marysville Brass Band furnished music.

During the evening an address was read by His Worship Mayor Gilbert, on behalf of the town council and the citizens, thanking Mr. and Mrs. Dolphin for the interest they had shown in the matter, and also the management of the Canadian Cottons, Ltd.

A speech was also made by Mr. Elias White, the oldest native resident of Marysville, who spoke of the development of the town.

Lieut. Col. W. H. Gray, ex-Mayor of the town, also spoke, dealing particularly with what Marysville had done during the war in the way of recruiting and contributing to the Patriotic Fund.

Later there was a fine display of fireworks.

The electric lighting system is under the direction of Mr. Charles Bowser, of Toronto. Besides furnishing light for the streets, it also has been extended to the residences owned by the company and to those of private citizens.
