The resignation of the Rev. Dr. A. B. Cohoe, the able and popular pastor of the First Baptist Church, of Halifax, was announced at the mid-week service Wednesday night. Dr. Cohoe has accepted a call to the First Baptist Church of Providence, Rhode Island, a church closely connected with Brown University, which has a large student body. Dr. Cohoe's resignation takes place the latter part of this month, and he will commence his new pastorate some time about the first of October.

Lieut. G. Roland Barnes, of the 5th C. M. R., has been awarded the military cross and promoted to the rank of captain. He participated in the fierce fighting of the first week in June, when the Canadians suffered heavily, but made a great showing. Lieut. Barnes is a Hampton boy and at the time of enlisting was a student at the University of New Brunswick. His father is Lieut. T. W. Barnes, of the 104th Battalion. He is a nephew of Mrs. F. S. Creed, of Fredericton.

Manzer, Fredericton.

Bun Beckwith a Prisoner.

PTE. L. R. SHELDEN WOUNDED IN CHEST IN RECENT ACTION

Now in Hospital at Boulogne--Father, Sergt. C. Alfred Sheldon and Brother Also Serving in France.

Mrs. C. A. Sheldon, Northumberland street, received a telegram from Ottawa this morning informing her that her son, Private Lewis Raymond Sheldon, No. 24,301, infantry, had been admitted to No. 25 General Hospital, Boulogne, France, on June 28, with a gunshot wound in the chest.

This is the second time Private Sheldon has been wounded. On the previous occasion he recovered and returned to the front.

Private Sheldon left Canada with the First Contingent. His father, Sergeant C. Alfred Sheldon, and a brother are also with the Canadian forces.

Sergt. C. A. Sheldon left Fredericton with the first draft from the 71st York Regiment, in August, 1914. He was a veteran of the South African war and a pensioner from the Royal Canadian Regiment.

Prior to joining the latter corps he had served several years in the Royal Garrison Artillery. He joined the 12th Battalion at Valcartier but transferred to the 13th Battalion, Montreal Highlanders, to be with one of his sons.

The Sheldon family has done its full share in the present war.

GOLF COURSE WILL BE PARTIALLY OPEN ON TUESDAY NEXT

Rapid Progress Being by New Organization---Archibald Fraser Gives Generous Assistance to Golf Club.

The Fredericton Golf Club is rapidly progressing toward active operation. On Monday the grass on the course is to be cut and it is expected that on Tuesday some of the holes will be in use. The course, when completed, it is said by experts, will be surpassed by none in eastern Canada.

In the language of Mr. Peacock, the professional golfer who laid it out, it will be the "sportiest" course in this part of the Dominion, meaning that it will offer more varieties of play than any other.

The club house, it is said, will cost in the neighborhood of \$2,000. The site selected is the highest land on the property of the Golf Club, and will overlook all of the nine holes of the course but one.

In addition to this view of the course there will be a magnificent view of the entire city and the river St. John.

Wide piazzas will be on three sides of the clubhouse, according to present intentions.

Mr. Archibald Fraser, of the firm of Fraser Limited, is taking a keen interest in the new organization, and has given generous financial assistance. Lieut. Col. Loggie is also displaying a marked interest. It is expected that the Golf Club will fill a long felt want and begin life with a large membership.

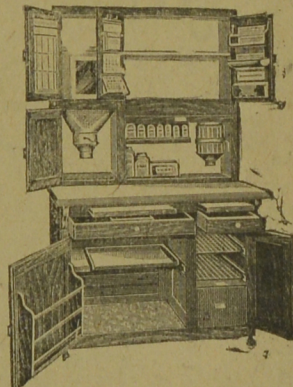
