## LEGISLATURE DISCUSSES CHANGES IN ELECTION LAW

Money From Crown Land Bonuses Being  
Used to Pay the Current Expenses of  
the Provinces--Names of Tenderers for  
Uncompleted Portion of the Valley Rail-  
way Withheld by the Government.

The legislature adjourned yesterday afternoon until next Tuesday. There has been no announcement regarding the Valley Railway bill or the prohibition measure, but it is expected that one or both of them will be introduced next week.

Yesterday the provincial treasurer told Mr. Dugal, when asked what the nature of the railway tax would be, that the particulars would be announced at the proper time.

Mr. Pelletier inquired who had tendered to build the uncompleted portion of the railway and was told:

"It is not thought in the public interest that names of tenderers, together with the amount of each tender, be made public at the present time. This information will be given after a contract, which is now being considered by the St. John & Quebec is let."

### Money From Lumber Bonuses.

A large sum of money from the lumber bonuses, \$438,217.67, which was supposed to be in the crown lands sinking fund, has, it appears, been kept in the consolidated account and used to pay the current expenses of the province. The provincial secretary made the statement in answer to Mr. Dugal's inquiry and it speaks for itself.

1. Is the sum of \$438,217.67, which is referred to in a note on page A-43 of the crown land sinking fund being used in whole or in part to pay the current expenses of the province?

Ans. Yes, it was thought to be good business from the standpoint of the province to use this money, which had yet been invested in the sinking fund account, to pay capital expenditures pending the sale of bonds, authorized to be issued to cover these expenditures. If we had borrowed that money from the banks on treasury bills we would have had to pay between five and six per cent. interest when this amount of \$438,217.67 would only have been drawing three per cent. Also since the sale of bonds to cover these capital expenditures which were paid by this amount the amount has been drawing three per cent. interest.

Contrary to expectation, the estimates of the public works were not considered yesterday and the expected criticism of James K. Pinder was not made.

Both Minister Morrissey and Pinder were in the House and each, it is said, was ready for the fray.

The House met on Friday at three o'clock.

Mr. Dugal gave notice of inquiry as to the gratuitous supply of potatoes for the Patriotic Fund from Gloucester county; also as to the cost of making the connection between the Gagetown section and Fredericton of the Valley Railway; also as to the funds placed at the disposal of the St. John & Quebec Railway; also as to a report of a speech of the Hon. J. A. Murray regarding the Valley Railway.

Mr. Pelletier gave notice of inquiry as to whether Hon. A. R. McLellan held any mortgage on certain property purchased by the Farm Settlement Board.

Hon. Mr. Baxter introduced a bill to enable the school trustees of Fredericton to issue debentures.

Mr. Dugal gave notice of motion for a return of all accounts of James Fabey, road commissioner, of Har-

court, for 1915.

Mr. Dugal inquired if the government were yet in a position to say what was proposed to be done regarding the tax on railways.

Hon. Dr. Landry said that the present was not the proper time to inquire or give the information asked for, but his honorable friend and all other members of the House would get the information in due course.

At this stage His Honor the Lieutenant Governor entered the Chamber and gave his assent to several bills.

### The Election Bill.

The House went into committee, with Mr. Munro in the chair and resumed the consideration of a bill respecting elections.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said this bill only provided the machinery for conducting elections, and a separate bill would shortly be introduced to the House regulating the various polling districts and sub-districts. Members had already been supplied with particulars regarding the present districts and if it was desired to make any change in these districts as now constituted, members should lose no time in so informing the clerk of the Executive Council, so that the necessary changes might be made before the bill came into the House rather than after.

On the section relating to ballots, Mr. Slipp suggested that all ballots should be of one size, as where separate ballots were provided by each candidate or ticket it might be possible to have some sort of check on how electors were voting.

Mr. Gagnan did not agree with the last speaker. He thought that the present ballot could not be improved upon. It had been found to work very satisfactorily in St. John and he was opposed to any change.

Mr. Lockhart agreed with the last speaker and was opposed to any change in the present system of ballots, which he thought was giving every satisfaction.

Mr. Smith said that he had watched very closely the working of the present election law since it had come into force and while it is true that it is hard to get any law that is perfect, yet hon. members would agree that the present law had worked well and he believed that the difficulty suggested by the hon. member for Queens with reference to the size of the ballot was largely imaginary.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said that there were instances where, under the present system, it had been possible at small polls to use combinations of initials and names to tell whether to use a common parlance, "the goods were delivered." He had had presented to him samples of ballots which had been used in Surbury county with this purpose alleged, the candidates whose names and initials had been used in the case referred to being W. M. Thurrott and J. P. Peake, who were candidates of the now opposition party. The proposed change in this bill was to make it so that the surnames only of the candidates would appear on the ballot and if there were two or more candidates of the same surname, then all the initials would be used. If the committee wanted all the names to be used as formerly, he had no objection, as his only idea was to prevent trickery at the polls as far as possible. Another provision made in the bill was that instead of just specifying that the ballots be of

white paper, this bill provided that they should be of unruled white paper.

Mr. Slipp said that he noticed nothing was specified as to the size of the ballots.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said that that was a difficult matter to fix, because of the fact that in some counties there were four representatives and there might be as many as three or more tickets in the field.

Mr. White (Carleton) said that if it was provided that the names of all candidates must be on the ballot he feared it would lead to confusion.

Mr. Lockhart asked if the bill provided that in case there was a double ballot it would have to be thrown out.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said that it certainly was the intention to have such a provision as the honorable member for St. John City had referred to and there had been a provision of that kind in the old act.

Mr. Jones said that many ballots were prepared by electors at home and it was a fact that many electors did not know the provisions of the election law as thoroughly as perhaps they should.

### Illegal Ballots.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey said that he agreed with the hon. member for Kings, who had just spoken. He believed that there would be a very great many illegal ballots because of lack of knowledge of the law if the proposed provision was made effective.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said that in view of the opinions expressed by the hon. member for Kings, the minister of public works and the views which the hon. minister of agriculture had just informed him he entertained, he thought it was best to allow the section of the bill to stand at least until the opinions of the members could be obtained. His whole object in the provisions that he had put into the bill was to stop trickery at the polling places, but while that was very necessary it would not do to deprive anybody of their votes to which they were justly entitled.

Mr. Lockhart thought the matter could be settled now. There was lit-

tle trouble with the provisions of the present act in this regard, and he did not see why the members could not come to a decision now as well as any other time.

The bill was then amended so as to make its provisions similar to the present act.

Mr. Young called attention to an instance in which a voter who had written the names of the candidates he wished to vote for on a piece of white paper with lines on it and the returning officer had thrown the ballot out.

Some little discussion took place on this point and ultimately the section was amended to provide that either ruled or unruled paper might be used.

Hon. Mr. Baxter moved to insert a sub-section providing that any voter who was challenged and refused to take the oath should not be allowed to vote at all.

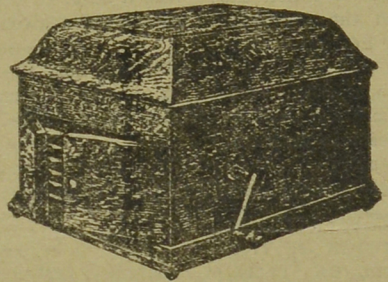
