HON. MR. HAZEN ONCE MORE CONVENIENTLY ABSENT

The Case of Col. Sheridan, ex-M. P. Brought up in Parliament by Mr. Carvell
 --Hon. Mr. Roche Had Not Heard of His Boodling--Mr. Carvell Hopes Mr. Stewart Will Not Get a Federal Government Job.

Col. Sheridan
 Ottawa, April 7.—During consideration of the estimates for the department of Indian affairs, at the evening session, A. K. MacLean, George Kyte and other Nova Scotia members criticized the appointment of C. Foster, former secretary of the Conservative Association of Halifax, a superintendent of Indian agency at a salary of \$1,800 per annum. They claimed that Foster had never done anything to earn his salary before he enlisted to go to the front, and that since then he had been drawing two salaries. The opposition members maintained that the job was purely political.

Colonel Sheridan's Case.

F. B. Carvell protested against the appointment of Colonel Sheridan, a former member of the Legislature of New Brunswick, as Indian agent at a salary of \$800 per annum. He said that Commissioner W. B. Chandler, who had inquired into the expenditure of road moneys, had found Sheridan and Stewart, member for Gloucester, guilty of misappropriation of funds. Sheridan had been kicked out of the Legislature and had soon after been given this position. Stewart had refused to resign from the Legislature until a few days ago when he had been forced to quit because of the force of public opinion.

Dr. Roche frankly stated that he had never heard this about Sheridan before.

He had been appointed in the ordinary manner and had no doubt been recommended by a member.

Mr. Carvell said he was glad to hear the minister make this statement, because he was trying to administer the affairs of his department in a proper manner. He expressed surprise that the Minister of the Interior had not been advised by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries as to the record of the man he had appointed. Mr. Carvell also expressed the hope that Mr. Stewart would not be provided with a job by the Dominion Government. The appointment of Sheridan, he said, had aroused public opinion more than anything that had happened since the revelations in regard to former Premier Flemming. Mr. Carvell commented on the "convenient absence" of Hon. J. D. Hazen from the chamber.

Hon. Mr. Kemp's Mistake.

Hon. A. E. Kemp, at the opening of the House, corrected an error in an answer given to a question in the House on Wednesday. In that reply it was stated that Sir Sam Hughes left Canada for England in 115 on June 3, and yesterday it was pointed out that the Minister of Militia had, on behalf of the British government, ratified fuse contracts on June 19. The acting Minister of Militia explained that the date upon which Sir Sam departed for Europe last year, was really July-3.

HUNS GAIN FOOTING IN SMALL FIELD WORKS NEAR VERDUN

PARIS, April 8.—The Germans renewed their attacks south of Haucourt, in the Verdun region, last night, and gained a footing in two small field works between Haucourt and Hill No. 287, the War Office announced today. Fighting with grenades between Bethincourt and Chantancourt turned to the advantage of the French. East of the Meuse there was intermittent bombardment of French positions. Near Fort Vaux the Germans made an attack with grenades and were repulsed.

FRENCH STEAMER ESCAPED.

MARSEILLES, France, April 8.—The large French passenger steamer Colbert was shelled without preliminary warning by a submarine in the Mediterranean, but being under a full head of steam, she escaped her aggressor by superior speed, at the same time sending out wireless messages of the submarine's presence to other ships in the vicinity. The Colbert is a vessel of 5,394 tons, 377 feet long and 47 feet beam, was built in 1908 at French Mediterranean shipyards.

AUSTRIAN TRANSPORT SUNK.

PARIS, April 8.—It was officially announced today that a French submarine has sunk an Austrian transport in Adriatic.

A SHEER INVENTION.

LONDON, April 8.—The following official statement was issued here today: "A statement has appeared in a Dutch newspaper to the effect that a captain of a Dutch mail boat has confirmed by oath that he saw captured German submarines on the Thames under command of British officers. This is a sheer invention."

OBTAINED MONEY AT MINTO ON FALSE PRETENSES

Three Frenchmen named Louis James, Joseph Taichen and Peter Baiden were arrested at the G.P.R. station here yesterday afternoon by Policeman Charles Marshall on the charge of obtaining money under false pretense. They were sent to Minto this morning, the charge against them being made there.

The three men were brought from Montreal by the Minto Coal Co. to work in the coal mines at Minto. Their transportation and expenses were advanced them on agreement that they would work and repay it. On their arrival at Minto they bought goods on credit and then refused to go to work. When arrested here they were trying to get back to Montreal via C.P.R.

FORTY-FOUR RECRUITS.

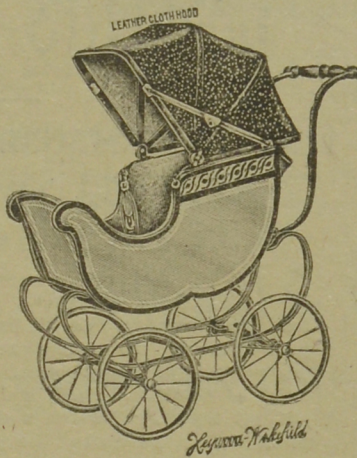

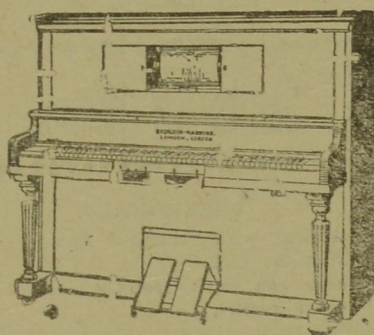

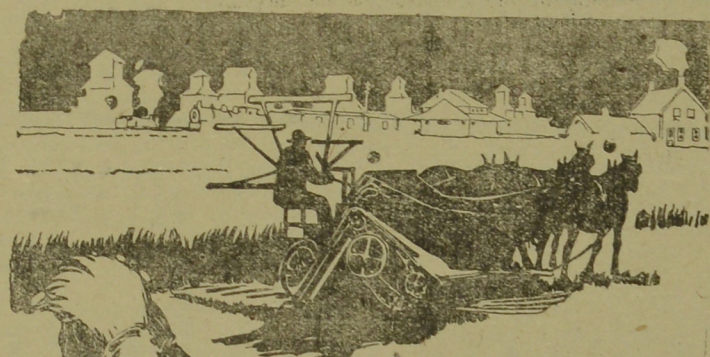
