## ENQUIRY ABOUT VALLEY RAILWAY

Government Would Not Divulge  
the Name of Tenderers, For  
Uncompleted Part of Road

A question in regard to the Valley Railway was answered in the House by Acting Premier Murray on Friday. Replying to Mr. Dugal, he said:

1. Were tenders asked for the construction of the Valley Railway from Gagetown south since the appointment of the new directors of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company?

Answer—Yes.

2. If so, between what points were tenders for construction asked for, and who were the tenderers and what were the amounts of each tender?

3. Were tenders asked for construction by the mile or by the method of actual yardage necessary for the grading and excavation preparatory to the laying of rails?

4. Were the tenders asked for completed work or just for the grading, and were the sleepers and rails to be supplied by the contractors or by the company?

Answers to Questions 2, 3 and 4.—The following is a copy of a notice calling for tenders issued by the St. John & Quebec Railway Company.

### PUBLIC NOTICE.

Tenders for the Construction of the Uncompleted Sections of the Saint John and Quebec Railway.

Tenders addressed to the undersigned will be received for the construction and equipment without rolling stock of the uncompleted sections of the line of the Saint John and Quebec Railway Company, in the Province of New Brunswick, at the office of the Company, Fredericton, N.B., up to 12 o'clock noon, on Thursday, the thirtieth day of December instant. Plans, profiles and specifications may be seen at the office of the company, Fredericton, N.B. Tenders are to state the cost per mile for a complete line of railway, without rolling stock, ready in every respect for operation by the lessee in accordance with the said plans, profiles and specifications. Tenders are to be accompanied by a certified check on a chartered bank, payable to the order of the Company, or cash deposit, in either case equal to five per centum of the amount of the tender, and in case of non-acceptance of any tender said cheque or deposit so accompanying such unaccepted tender will be returned to the tenderer. In case of the acceptance of any tender, said cheque or deposit will be retained as a guarantee for the due completion of the contract. The lowest or any tender not necessarily accepted.

It is not thought in the public interests that the names of the tenderers, together with the amount of each tender, be made public at the present time. This information will be given after a contract for further construction, which is now being considered by the St. John & Quebec Railway Co., is let.

## COMMODORE STEWART CORRECTS HON. DR. LANDRY

Quotes a Statement From the Budget  
Speech and Says it is Entirely Contrary  
to the Records of the Legislature.

(Chatham World.)

Hon. Dr. Landry, in his budget speech, referring to Mr. Carvell's statement in parliament that Mr. Stewart of Northumberland, had failed to get from Dr. Landry a statement of the public debt of the province, said:

"He wished to challenge that statement by Mr. Carvell. The public records had been brought down in the House showing just what the debt was and these records were true records of the actual state of the debt of the province at the time! On April 26, 1915, Mr. Stewart had moved a resolution for papers 'showing the total indebtedness of this province, said returns to give a list of all bond issues, outstanding treasury notes, loans and other interest-bearing obligations of the province with the date of issue and a detailed statement of the interest to be paid on them during the current year. These papers as requested, were brought down and what more could be done? It was true that Mr. Stewart had got up in the House and said that he could not understand the returns, but that was not the government's fault it was Mr. Stewart's."

Dr. Landry's statement is entirely contrary to the records of the legislature. He withheld the statement to which he refers, promising day after day to bring it down and giving flimsy excuses for not doing so. It was not until the last day of the session, when there was no possibility of discussing the statement, and after Mr. Stewart had left for home, that the statement was laid on the table and instead of its being printed in the appendix of the legislative report, with other answers to inquiries, it was suppressed and so far as Mr. Stewart knows, has never been given publicity. He has not seen it yet and consequently, did not, as Dr. Landry asserts, get up in the House and say he did not understand the return. In short, Hon. Dr. Landry's statement is, as a British statesman once said of an opponent's assertions "a terminological inaccuracy!" It was a previous return of Dr. Landry's that Mr. Stewart condemned as a jumble of meaningless phrases that did not answer the question he had asked, and to which condemnation Dr. Landry pleaded that he had not understood the question.

## LEGISLATURE DISCUSSES CHANGES IN ELECTION LAW

he was a British subject. He should be made to swear that he had taken the oath of allegiance. Lots of men of foreign origin who had resided in the province for several years might very readily swear that they thought they were British subjects.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said it was hard to get a form of oath which would suit everybody. A man could not be a British subject unless he had taken the oath of allegiance.

Some discussion ensued upon the question of the qualifications for voters.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said it was highly important to have the provincial voting register as perfect as possible because it was used for the dominion elections as well. That being the case, there should be one rule for everybody. The main thing was that every voter should know what were the essential qualifications which he must possess in order to permit him to exercise the franchise. He thought that a little consideration would show members that the form of oath which a man might be called upon to take was all right.

Mr. Witzell called attention to the situation in Gloucester, where the sheriff was called upon to post notices on Miscou Island; at some seasons of the year he might have to stay on the Island some days before he could return and he moved that the same provisions be made for Gloucester county as were applied to Chignecto.

This was done and progress then reported.  
The House adjourned at six o'clock until Tuesday afternoon.
