DUAL PATRONAGE SYSTEM
NOT WORKING WELL IN YORK

The Parish of Southampton Has Two Government
Appointed Revisors and Both Are After the Fee
Attached to the Job--Where Mr. Young,
M. P. P. Butted in.

As a result of the dual patronage
system now in vogue in the County of
York, the Parish of Southampton has
more revisors than it knows what to
do with. Under the law the two
county councillors are also revisors,
and a third, who acts as chairman, is
appointed by the Provincial Govern-
ment.

Last year ex-Coun. Jas. T. Masten
was appointed and gazetted chairman
for the Parish of Southampton, on the
recommendation of Mr. James K.
Pinder, M. P. P., who is a resident of
the parish and is of course in touch
with local conditions. It seems that
before Mr. Masten was appointed, Mr.
John A. Young, M. P. P., who labors
under the belief that he has the sole
right to dispense patronage for the
Local Government in York, had prom-
ised the position to Mr. Ralph
Brooks, a son of ex-Warden Frank R.
Brooks, a prominent Tory of South-
ampton, who has been promised a
recommission on the government ticket
at the next election. Mr. Brooks
wanted the job for his son, and called
upon Mr. Young to make good his
promise.

As Mr. Masten's appointment had
been gazetted, Mr. Young was in a
quandary for the time being. He ex-
plained the situation to the Attorney
General and the Premier and expressed
a desire to "put one over on Mr.
Pinder."

These great statesmen put their
heads together and hit upon a rather
unique plan. They decided to inform
the public through the columns of the
Royal Gazette that the appointment of
Mr. Masten was a typographical error
and that the name should have read
"Ralph R. Brooks." This little trick
is supposed to have cancelled the ap-
pointment of Mr. Masten, but the lat-
ter, who is no spring chicken, declin-
ed to fall for it. When the board of
revisors met in November he was
right on hand and asserted his rights

as chairman. Mr. Brooks was also
on hand, and both attached their
names to the official electoral list, and
now both are claiming the fee which
goes with the job. So far neither has
been able to secure it. Mr. Pinder
is behind Mr. Masten and has prom-
ised to see him through. Mr. Young is
behind Mr. Brooks, and has promised
to see that he gets the money. In the
meantime people are wondering if the
voter's list for the Parish of South-
ampton for 1915 is legal or not.

This is one of several scurvy tricks
which Mr. Young has played during
the past year in connection with pa-
tronage matters in Southampton. Hav-
ing stabbed Mr. Pinder in the back at
every opportunity, he is now trying
to induce one of Mr. Pinder's closest
friends to accept a nomination for the
Local House and assist in the task of
eliminating the old gentleman at the
next election. He had already prom-
ised the nomination to ex-Warden
Brooks, but is now ready to throw
him overboard, providing he can get
the other man to accept. As a politi-
cal manipulator Mr. Young is positive-
ly a joke.

WAR TAX STAMP.

Ottawa, Jan. 6.—The new stamp of
three cent value, issued by the Post-
master General to overcome the in-
convenience caused by the necessity
of affixing an extra war stamp of one
cent to all letters, is now being sent
out.

The stamp is the ordinary two-
cent stamp surcharged with the let-
ters 1Tc (one cent tax).

By using the plate of the ordinary
two-cent stamp the issue has been
facilitated and is now being made at
the rate of a million a day.

LOOKING AFTER SOLDIERS FAMILIES

MONTREAL was the birthplace of
the Patriotic Fund. Montreal
made the record of over \$1,613,-
000 collected in the six days whirlwind
campaign, September, 1914, and the
organization under which the Montreal
Branch distributes relief is considered
a model of effective and economical
administration.

Montreal and the Island of Montreal
have been divided into twenty-seven
districts, the interests of which are
looked after by fifty-six ladies acting
as Ward Heads, under the supervision
of Miss Helen Reid. These are assisted
by about six hundred lady visitors
who undertake to make periodical
visits to the families of soldiers at the
front, investigate and report on cases
where relief is requested, and gener-
ally act as friends to those who might
otherwise be friendless. Although
there are certain Government allow-
ances, these are often found to be in-
sufficient for large families, and at
times, especially in the case of illness,
immediate relief has to be given. The
mothers are given expert advice on
hygiene and the care of infants, and
encouraged to keep their children regu-
larly at church and school (twenty
prizes are given for the best school
reports), are taught principles of thrift
and given free legal advice. The slo-
gans under which the lady visitors
work are such as "Provide Opportunity
not Charity—and be a friend," "Guard
the Fund—do not patronize—do not

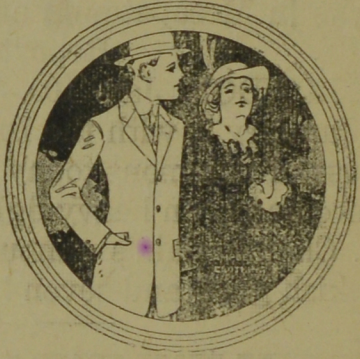
promise" and "Your service is per-
sonal, patriotic and civic. Let it be
kindly, loyal and efficient."

The French speaking families are
cared for by French speaking ladies,
each ward having a French-Canadian,
as well as an English-Canadian head.
During the summer months lectures
have been given in the both languages
on hygiene and domestic economy, and
the Parish Priests, the Ward Alder-
men, Ministers and Teachers are en-
couraged to take an interest in cases
in their district or parish. There is a
Patriotic Burial Fund and Cemetery
Lots, a storage for furniture, and baby
outfits and clothing for special cases.
Over 300 doctors give their services
without charge.

A wonderful system of card index-
ing and filing enables the Relief Com-
mittee to handle all cases with prompt-
ness and efficiency. There are between
forty to seventy-five advices each day
of changes in address, desertion, births
and deaths, illnesses or discharges. In
one single month 1,500 removals have

been notified. The average daily at-
tendance is about 300 mothers. Great
care has to be taken that the Fund is
economically spent and that no dupli-
cate or unnecessary payments should
be made, and this is only possible
when the office organization is busi-
nesslike. The filing room alone occu-

pies the time of three ladies. So
efficient, however, has been the Mont-
real administration, that the Boston
Charity Organization Society has asked
for a report and it is likely that the
Montreal methods will be adopted in
this and other cities of the United
States.
