Sears Smith of St. John, and Gordon Steeves of Moncton, are reported wounded with the 14th Battalion.

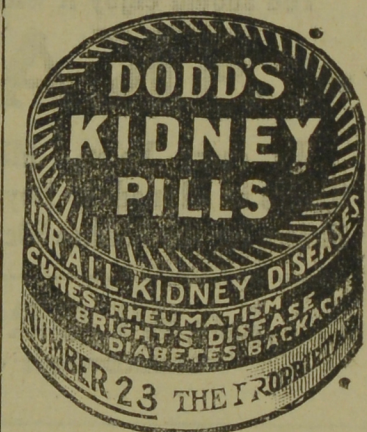

ATHLETE IS A STAR

Russell Kriss of Cleveland, O., handicapped by the loss of a leg, is one of the athletic wonders of the age.

He is playing basketball this winter and promises to be a star among high school pill shooters.

Kriss played on seven varsity teams in grade school and was awarded seven letters. He is a broad and high jumper, plays a line position in football and an outfield in baseball.

He starred in a state interscholastic meet and was sent to other cities to represent his school in sectional athletic tournaments.

Kriss has unusual strength in his one leg. He hops about with as much speed as some athletes with two good legs.

In basketball he plays guard and sticks to his opponent like a leech. In jumps he takes a few hops to reach the take-off, then his powerful leg shoots him into the air as though it were a steel spring.

Kriss stands high in his school study classes.

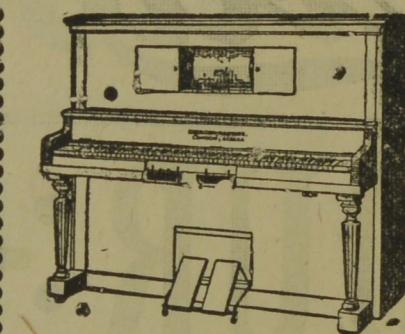
