And England is mistress today.

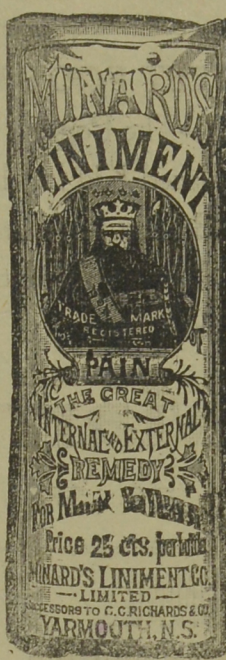
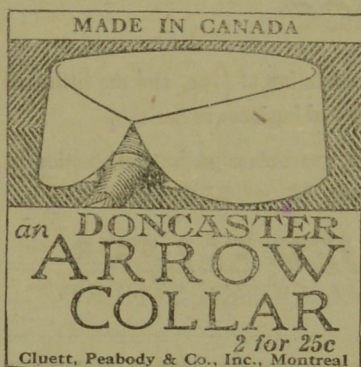
God bless the brave heroes who fight
