## FALL RIVER, MASS., VISITED BY A DESTRUCTIVE FIRE

(Canadian Press.)

Fall River, Mass., Feb. 16.—Estimates by owners of property and proprietors of the store in the business section swept by fire early today indicated that the total would be approximately two million dollars. A score of buildings, including an apartment hotel and several of the largest retail stores in the city were destroyed and many others were badly damaged. There was no loss of life.

Fall River, Mass., Feb. 15.—A large square of buildings in the centre of the business district was wiped out by fire early today, causing a loss estimated at between \$1,000,000 and \$1,500,000. Starting from a explosion in the basement of the Staiger department store at the corner of Spring and South Main streets, the flames swept over the structures in the square marked by Spring, Columbia, South Main and Pearl streets. A shift in the wind suddenly turned

the flames toward the congested tenement district where there is a large mill population.

Here the Fall River apparatus, with engines from the neighboring cities of Newport, R.I., Taunton and New Bedford opposed a barrier of water to the march of the flames and only a few of the outlying houses were burned.

Tenants in the Lenox Hotel, a four-story brick apartment house, were forced to run to the snow-filled streets in their night clothes. Hundreds of mill workers also fled from their homes and some of the streets were filled with furniture.

The principal blocks destroyed included the Edwards, Flynn, Campbell Staiger and Lenox buildings and many large business firms including the Cobb Bates and Yerxa grocery store and the Brady Drug Company were burned out. Snow covered roofs and good water pressure saved the city from an even worse conflagration.

tioned.

Financed Till Early Summer.

"I have now to direct the attention of the house to the matter of the borrowings by which we shall supplement our revenues to the full amount necessary to meet our war expenditure for the coming year. At present we are financed as to our requirements in Canada until the beginning of summer. We have, however, a large body of troops, over one hundred thousand overseas, whose pay and cost of maintenance run into large figures, and will continually increase as its number increases. To provide this money, and as an efficient safeguard to our own financial situation in Canada, we arranged last fall for a total authorized loan of thirty million pounds from the imperial treasury to be availed of, if necessary, at a rate not exceeding £2,800,000 a month during the present calendar year. While this arrangement absolutely ensures the stability of our finances for the year, it will be our most earnest endeavor to avail ourselves as little as possible of this generous provision on the part of the imperial government, sustaining, as it is, the heavy burden of financing its own unparalleled war expenditures and making loans on a vast scale to the Allies. Further, it is our intention, to the extent we may be able, to make advances in Canada to the imperial government to facilitate its additional purchases here of munitions and supplies."

Sir Thomas White concluded as follows:

"The conflict has developed and extended upon a scale and to an extent far beyond our expectations or imaginings at its inception. Looking backward upon its tragic course and reflecting upon its varied fortunes, there has grown in the hearts and minds of all an ever-deepening sense of its increasing gravity and menace to the empire's safety. But the empire's courage and the empire's strength have steadily grown with the growing peril. Never has our national spirit been more high, never our resolve more unshaken, never have we been more supremely confident of ultimate victory than we are today. We have taken the measure of our foe, we have estimated the resources of our manhood and the other elements of imperial power and we steadfastly abide the issue in calm consciousness of inherent strength and the eternal justice of our cause. We fight for human progress and for human rights and we can and shall endure unto the end."

## Saving Clause For American Exporters

London, Feb. 16.—In the opinion of American importers here, the royal proclamation of yesterday, forbidding importation after March 1 of certain commodities, including tobacco, furniture woods, wall paper and kood pulp, would prove disastrous to American traders were it not for the saving clause which permits the bringing in of these articles under license from the Board of Trade. American importers do a large business in these commodities.

Owing to the provision for trading under licenses, it is believed that the chief effect of the order will be to give the British government greater control over free tonnage.

## Looks Like Settlement In Lusitania Case

(Canadian Press.)

Washington, Feb. 16.—Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, today presented to Secretary of State Lansing the latest draft of the Lusitania agreement, embodying the changes suggested by the American government and also one change suggested by Berlin.

The indications were that the agreement in its present form, probably would be acceptable to the United States.

When Count Von Bernstorff came from Mr. Lansing's office after a visit of less than ten minutes, he said:

"Gentlemen, I refer you to the secretary of state."

Almost at the same time Mr. Lansing sent out this message:

"I have nothing to say."

## Civilian Prisoners To Be Released

Stockholm, Feb. 16 (via London).—Austria and Germany have acquiesced in the proposal made by Prince Carl of Sweden, regarding the release of civilians taken prisoner on the frontier of Galicia, Bukovina, east Prussia and Poland. Russia is also expected to acquiesce in the proposal.
