

A BY-LAW RELATING TO THE RE-MOVAL OF SNOW FROM SIDEWALKS.

(Passed February 12th, 1913.) ricton, as follows:

In this By-law the word "side walk" shall mean that portion of a treet lying between the gutter and the outer margin of the street, reserved or the use of pedestrians.

2. The owner, occupier, agent or person in charge of any property on any street, within the City shall:

(1) Within ten hours after the City snow-plow shall have plowed out the sidewalk opposite his property, remove and level or cause to be removed and levelled the snow ridge left by the snow-plow opposite his property.

2) At all times keep any snow or ice

on any sidewalk opposite his property level and even on the surface and alow no accumulation o hereon to a greater depth than six

(3) Promptly remove or cause to be removed any ice or snow falling from any biulding on the sidewalk oppo-

site his property.

3. All snow or ice removed from any sidewalk shall be entirely hauled away, or, when permitted by the Street Comnissioner, may be scattered and levelled along opposite said property to the satisfaction of the said Commissioner. 4. No snow or ice hauled or removed from any private yard or premises

shall be deposited on any street.

5. No snow or ice hauled from any part of the city shall be deposited on the river Saint John within two hunlred feet of low water mark of the city

hore of said river.
6. No snow or ice shall be deposited on any public wharf or along any road-way leading to or from the river Saint

Any person convicted of a breach of any provision of this By-law shall be iable to a penalty of not exceeding Fifty Dollars for each offence.
