FORMER AMERICAN CITIZEN IN THE NEW BRITISH CABINET

He is Sir Albert Stanley, Who Got His
Training Here--H.W. Thornton, "Alien"
Was Mentioned Too.

(New York Sun.)

The elevation of Sir Albert Stanley to a position in the newly organized British cabinet was hailed in New York as a distinct triumph for the industrial pre-eminence of the United States. Railwaymen especially were pleased, as Sir Albert is regarded throughout Great Britain as the man who Americanized London's transit facilities.

"The live wire of English transportation," is the Railway World's characterization of the only ex-citizen of the United States to force his way into the exclusive circle of men who rule the empire on whose possessions the sun never sets. And the United States claims credit for the industrial education which enabled him to win the approbation of so astute a judge of men as David Lloyd George, the virtual dictator of the Empire.

Another ex-American.

Coupled with the name of Stanley in the present crisis is that of Henry W. Thornton, a native of the United States but a naturalized British subject.

Thornton just failed of appointment to the cabinet, but he was "mentioned" for a place and may be made chairman of the Executive Council in charge of mobilization and have a large part in the future conduct of the war.

Strangely enough, golf plays no small

part in the preferment of the two Americans, according to men who knew them intimately in London. Sir Albert's reorganization of the underground and tramway systems of the metropolis was the determining factor in his invitation to become President of the Board of Trade in the Lloyd George ministry, but his acquaintance with the men close to the "little Welch solicitor," was formed on the golf links rather than in the city, according to his friends.

Once a United States Citizen.

Sir Albert was managing director of the London transit system when called to a portfolio in Britain's new war cabinet. He was called after a most remarkable record of achievement.

Although of English birth, Albert Stanley was a citizen of the United States when the Speyer interests drafted him from the Public Service Railway Co. of New Jersey in 1907 to go to London to take charge of their holdings in the Charles Tyson Yerkes railway companies of London.

It was not until 1913 (about one year before the war) that the railway man, who had married a New York girl, became a British subject. Yet within a year he had been raised to knighthood by King George and now, in a little less than three years, he is a member of the government of the realm.

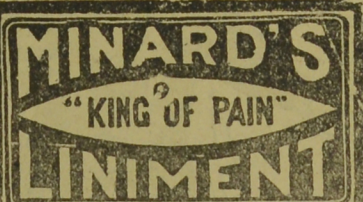

The Late Georgianna Morehouse.

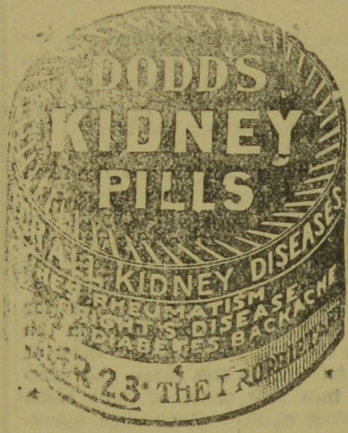

No. 27.

A BY-LAW RELATING TO THE REMOVAL OF SNOW FROM SIDEWALKS.

(Passed February 12th, 1913.)
Be it enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. In this By-law the word "sidewalk" shall mean that portion of a street lying between the gutter and the outer margin of the street, reserved for the use of pedestrians.

2. The owner, occupier, agent or person in charge of any property on any street, within the City shall:

(1) Within ten hours after the City snow-plow shall have plowed out the sidewalk opposite his property, remove and level or cause to be removed and levelled the snow ridge left by the snow-plow opposite his property.

(2) At all times keep any snow or ice on any sidewalk opposite his property level and even on the surface and allow no accumulation of ice or snow thereon to a greater depth than six inches.

(3) Promptly remove or cause to be removed any ice or snow falling from any building on the sidewalk opposite his property.

3. All snow or ice removed from any sidewalk shall be entirely hauled away, or, when permitted by the Street Commissioner, may be scattered and levelled along opposite said property to the satisfaction of the said Commissioner.

4. No snow or ice hauled or removed from any private yard or premises shall be deposited on any street.

5. No snow or ice hauled from any part of the city shall be deposited on the river Saint John within two hundred feet of low water mark of the city shore of said river.

6. No snow or ice shall be deposited on any public wharf or along any roadway leading to or from the river Saint John.

7. Any person convicted of a breach of any provision of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding Fifty Dollars for each offence.

Public attention is directed to the above By-law.
