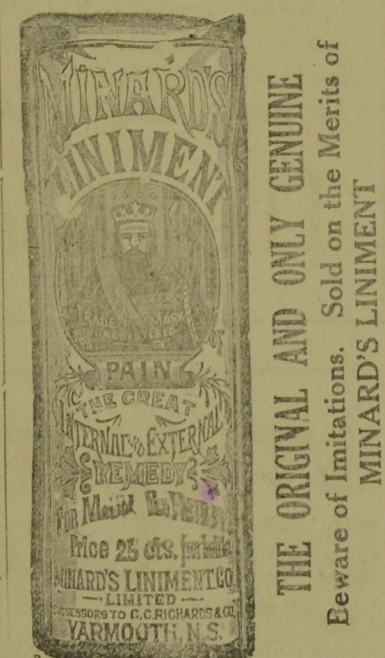
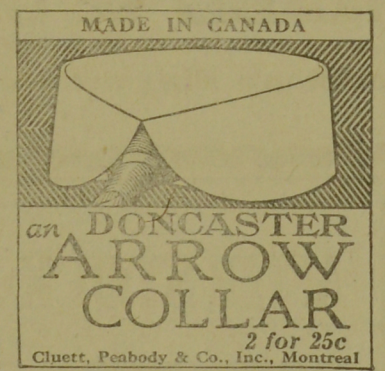

with any amount of water."

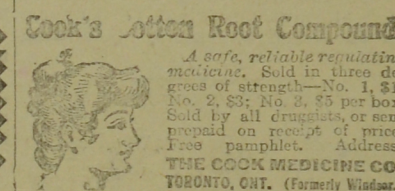
