FREE FIGHT IN
N. H. A. MATCH
AT MONTREAL

Canadiens Beat Quebec
4 to 3--Toronto Beat
Ottawa 9 to 2 in One-
Sided-Game.

Montreal, Feb. 27.—Canadiens defeat
ed Quebec by 4 to 3 at the Montreal
Arena Saturday night in their final
meeting of the season in the N.H.A.
schedule. Immediately following the
scoring of the winning goal by Cana-
diens a free fight was precipitated by
Hall of Quebec, striking Arbour of
the local team. Not only players of
both sides became involved in the
mix-up, but spectators also took a
hand in it. The police had to be
called in to quell the trouble.

Toronto, Feb. 27.—Torontos so far
outclassed Ottawa last night in the
N.H.A. game at the Arena that the
spectators had little chance to en-
thuse. The score was 9 to 2.

CRESCUS, GREAT
TROTTER STALLION,
DEAD IN RUSSIA

Had a Record Mark of
2.02 1-4 and Was Only
Stallion that ever held
World's Trotting record

Cleveland, Feb. 25.—Word has been
received from Frank Caten, a Cleve-
land trainer of trotting horses in
Russia, that Crescus, 2:02 1/4, died
there last December. He was the
only stallion that ever held the
world's record for trotters and was
regarded by some horsemen as the
greatest trotter, all things consid-
ered, ever seen.

Bred, trained and driven in all his
races by an amateur—George H.
Ketcham of Toronto—he lowered all
records and defeated all rivals in
some of the greatest harness races
in the annals of trotting. He was
foaled in 1894 and therefore was
twenty-one years old when he died.

His record of 2:02 1/4 was made
against time at Columbus on August
2, 1901. Shortly afterward he defeat-
ed The Abbot, 2:03 1/4, in the fastest
race then an record before twenty-
five thousand persons, at Brighton
Beach, near New York. He was a
failure in the stud and about ten
years ago was sold for export to
Russia. He was by Robert McGregor
2:16 1/2, dam Mabel, y Howard's
Mambrino.

BIRMINGHAM SETTLERS
DISPUTE WITH SOMMERS

Cleveland, Feb. 25.—Joe Birming-
ham, deposed manager of the Cleve-
land American Club, today settled his
suit for \$20,000 back salary and dam-
ages with Charles Somers, former
owner of the club, by compromising.
The sum he will receive was not
divulged by A. V. Cannon, attorney
for Somers. Birmingham asked for
\$12,000 back salary and \$8000 dam-
ages. The suit did not include \$10,000
which Birmingham loaned to Somers
on a note.

Veteran Leaves Ring at
Age of Thirty After Ten
Years of Hard Battl-
ing.

New York, Feb. 25.—The permanent
retirement of Leach Cross from the
boxing ring was announced today by
his brother and manager, Samuel
Wallach. His knockout by Young
Saylor in Cincinnati is said to have
convinced Cross that it was time to
quit. For ten years Cross fought the
leading lightweights of the country
and it is claimed that he never quit
or fought a suspected battle. He is
thirty years old.

SIR SAM HUGHES
GOING TO THE FRONT

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—General Sir Sam
Hughes, minister of militia, will be
at the battle front with the Canadian
overseas forces by the end of May or
the beginning of June next. This im-
portant news was communicated to
your correspondent through official
channels tonight. Sir Sam will prob-
ably be accompanied by Captain
Harold Daly, son of the late Hon. T.
M. Daly, of Winnipeg, and Captain
John Bassett of the parliamentary
press gallery, both of whom are at-
tached to the headquarters' staff of
the militia department.

Your correspondent understands
that the coming trip of General
Hughes is being made at the express
invitation of the British government.
The Canadian minister, who declined
to make any statement for publi-
cation, when interviewed by your cor-
respondent tonight, will probably
spend some months with the troops
in the field and rumour has it that he
may, at least for a time, take active
command of the Canadian forces. It
will be remembered that when Col-
onel Hughes spoke some time ago at
Massey Hall, Toronto, he expressed
his earnest desire to have some per-
sonal part with his men on the field
of battle.

It is believed that the formal pas-
ports for General Hughes and his
staff are already on the way and that
all arrangements are being made to
enable him to leave as soon as the
work of the parliamentary session is
over.

PROHIBITION BEFORE HOUSE.

Parliament will tackle prohibition
tomorrow. With the disposal of in-
troductions routine the dominion-wide
resolution takes the right-of-way. It
calls for the total abolition of the
sale and manufacture of intoxicat-
ing liquors in Canada for the en-
tire duration of the war. The resolution
is sponsored by H. H. Stevens, Con-
servative member for Vancouver, and
Hon. Charles Macell, Liberal member
for Bonaventure and former Speaker
of the House.

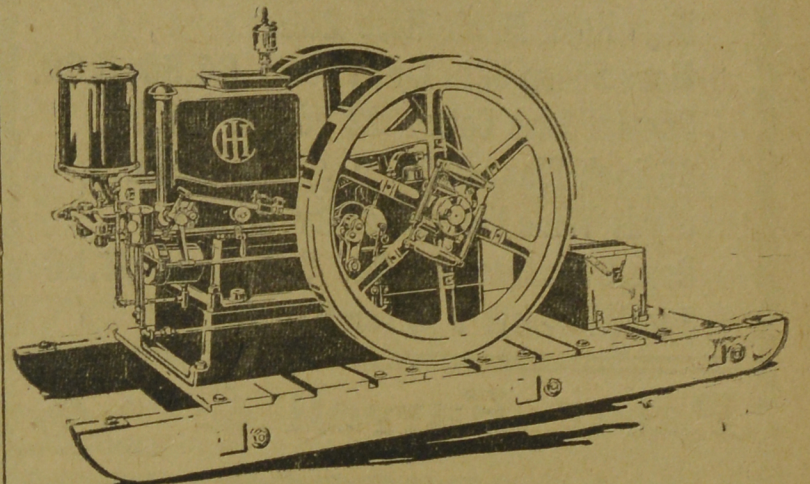

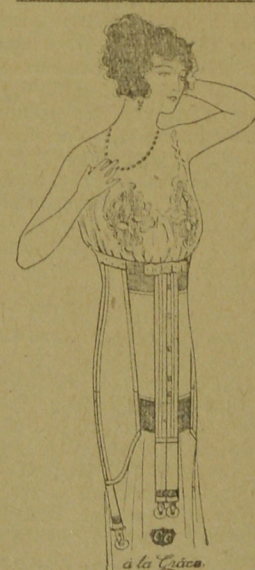
