BIG RUSH FOR PERMITS TODAY WHEN SCHOOLS REOPENED

Record Enrolment Expected--Several Registered in Pre-Vocational Department--Establishment of Districts Confusing.

Mr. C. A. Sampson, secretary of the School Board, is overwhelmed today by the rush for permits to enter the city schools which reopened this morning. It will be some days before the total school attendance will be known exactly, but a record enrolment is expected.

The division of the city into two districts has produced some confusion. This has necessitated some pupils being assigned to a school different from that which they had been attending, much to the annoyance of both pupils and parents. It is thought that this difficulty will work out in time.

The pre-vocational department which was opened today for the first time, has some ten or fifteen pupils. The number will likely increase.

Miss Emily Thompson, who was transferred from the Smythe Street School to the Charlotte Street School, was too ill this morning to take charge of her department, and Miss Esther Clark supplied in her place.

Will Not Go Overseas.
