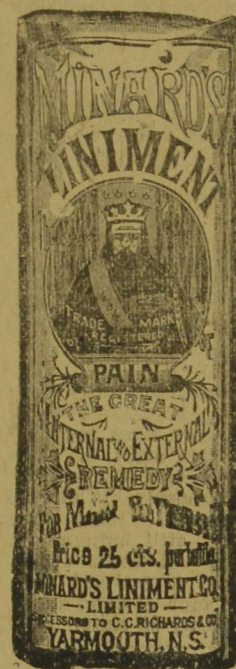

Woman's Column

WHAT THE COOK KNOWS.

To test a nutmeg prick it with a pin. If good, oil will immediately spread around the puncture.

Keep the roots of the celery plant dry, grate them and mix the powder with one-third as much salt. Keep it in a bottle, well corked. This is delicious in soups, gravies, hashes, etc.

Fish scales can easily be removed by pouring hot water on the fish slowly until the scales curl; then scrape quickly. Wash in several waters, having the last cold and well salted, so no stime will be left.

If cup custards are placed in a pan of water and cooked on top of the stove there will be less liability of their over-cooking, as they can be carefully watched. Just before they are done, place in the oven to brown them on top.

In serving oyster or clam cocktails, instead of putting them in glasses, try serving them from the shells. In the centre of the plate place a green pepper hollowed out and filled with the condiments. Each oyster is dipped into it before being eaten.

Most salads should be dressed just before serving, whether French dressing or mayonnaise is used. Celery or lettuce wilts if left in oil and vinegar. Celery should not even be washed long before serving, as it becomes rusty. Potato salad is an exception to the rule. Potatoes take up large quantities of oil and need to be very well mixed with whatever dressing is used.

CONCERNING WOMEN.

Miss Alice McCoy, aged 13, has been awarded the grand championship of Louisiana in pig raising.

Among the constitutional reforms now being considered by the Netherlands government is one providing for universal woman suffrage in that country.

Miss Julia C. Lathrop, head of the children's bureau, is the highest paid woman on the pay roll of the United States government.

The Rev. Gertrude Von Petzold, who was expelled from England, has been elected assistant pastor of the American church in Berlin.

Woman tramway conductors on the Leeds, England, cars receive 11 cents an hour, which is the same rate of pay as received by the men.

Mrs. John Graber, an ardent suffragist, has been elected constable of the town of Smith, O., an office for which she was not a candidate. She did not even know that she was being voted for.

In Japan women not only work in the home, but go out for service. Little girls are employed in large numbers as nurses for babies. Then they are the maid servants either in private houses or in tea houses and hotels.

TO SERVE POTATOES.

Serve potatoes plain boiled only when they are new.

With roast meat serve potatoes mashed, or roasted in the pan with the meat—peeled of course.

With fricasseed meats serve baked potatoes.

With broiled steak serve creamed potatoes with a crisp fried vegetable like egg plant.

With roast pork serve baked potatoes, a green vegetable and a sour apple sauce.

With roast chicken serve mashed potatoes, onions and a sour jelly.

With roast lamb serve mashed potatoes, green peas or string beans, and a mint sauce.

A SMART COMBINATION.

In Paris the leading tailors are combining navy serve with dark crimson silk, an effective touch of black fur being introduced very discreetly.

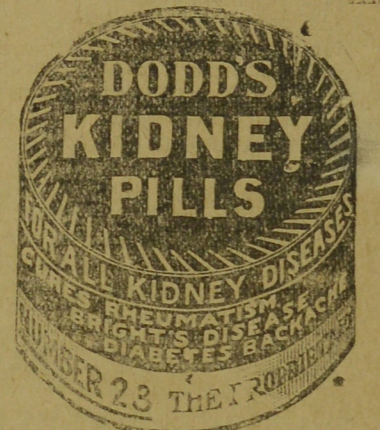
Crimson and dark blue always look well together. For some years past this combination of color has been voted rather ordinary, but it is once again immensely popular.
