WHY THE AGREEMENT WAS TERMINATED

That the shilly shallying of the provincial government was responsible for the dominion government jacking up on its agreement in connection with the Valley Railway was shown by the reply to an enquiry handed out by the minister of railways to Mr. Carvell yesterday. The incident is thus reported in an Ottawa despatch:

"In reply to Mr. Carvell, the minister of railways said that no new agreement had yet been entered into with the Province of New Brunswick in regard to a joint arrangement for the operation of the Valley Railway. The arrangement which existed up to the beginning of the present year, whereby New Brunswick received forty per cent. of the gross earnings, and the Intercolonial sixty per cent., as compensation for operating the road, had been terminated on the ground of 'non-completion of the provincial road.' Negotiations are still on for a new agreement."

In connection with alleged plans of the conspirators to destroy public buildings and church property, church records show that two score or more Chicago churches have suffered fire losses within the last few years. At the Moody church it was said no less than six fires, said to have been of incendiary origin, have been discovered and extinguished with small losses during the past year.

One of the interesting developments in the case yesterday was the finding of a letter in Allegrini's pocket in which reference was made to a fund collected for the widow of Gaetano Bresci, who assassinated King Humbert of Italy.

Subsequent developments have led the police to believe that Cronos and Allegrini may have had knowledge of the plot to assassinate the Italian monarch.

"YOUR BATTLES ARE OUR BATTLES"

Some Straight Talk by an American
Member of Ours: as
Battalion.

(Canadian Press.)

Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 15.—"You Canadians should not be too sharp in criticism of old Uncle Sam in his attitude in connection with the scrap across the pond. It must be remembered that there are two or three hundred Americans who have joined the Western Irish Battalion and are only too glad to do our part to whip the Germans."

The speaker was Private Seymour, who wears on his hat the badge of the 101st Battalion, Western Irish. "I received my honorable discharge from the 10th Company of the United States Coast Artillery at Fort Wayne, Washington some months ago."

"When we received our discharges, thirty-eight of us, the colonel of our regiment said: 'Boys, if you have nothing else to do, or have made no definite plans for the future, do me a favor and go and fight for Canada. We loved the old colonel and many of us gave the matter serious thought. The result was that today thirty-two of that thirty-eight are wearing the khaki and are ready to do or die, if necessary, for Canada. And there are many more who are strong for our brothers. Your battles are our battles and we will go through thick and thin to beat the Germans.'"

JOHN G ADAMS PASSED AWAY THIS MORNING

John G. Adams, one of Fredericton's oldest and best known business men, passed away this morning at his residence, 459 Brunswick street, at about seven o'clock, after a long illness. He was sixty-three years of age in May last. Three sons and three daughters survive. They are Harry R. Adams, Mrs. Harry McKee, Miss Alta Adams, Jackson Adams and Miss Mary Adams, all at home, and Fred J. Adams of Vancouver. Three brothers and one sister also survive. They are Robert B. Adams, William A. Adams and Miss William Adams of this city, and George Adams of Brockton, Mass.

He was a member of Hiram Lodge, No. 2, A. F. & A. M., for the greater part of his life and the funeral will be under Masonic auspices. The funeral will leave the house at 2.45 on Thursday afternoon and service will begin at St. Paul's Presbyterian church at three o'clock, Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith conducting it.

LOSS OF CRUISER IS CONFIRMED

Paris, Feb. 14.—Reports of the loss of the French cruiser Amiral Charner, which was reported to have been sunk by a submarine while patrolling the Syrian coast, were confirmed today.

According to information received at the French Ministry of Marine, a raft bearing one live sailor and the bodies of fourteen of his companions has been picked up off the coast of Syria.

An official statement yesterday said no news had been received from the cruiser since Feb. 8, when, according to a German telegram, a submarine had sunk "a French warship."

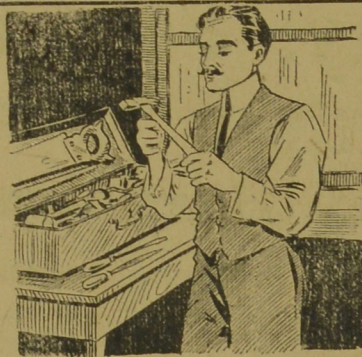
