

# WOMAN SAVES HUSBAND FROM A BURNING CAMP

(Bangor News.)

Awakened at 2.30 o'clock Tuesday morning by a rush of smoke and flame, Mrs. Charles S. Edmunds dragged her unconscious husband from the camp they occupied at West Sebois Lake.

For hours the two shivered in their night clothing and when daylight arrived they walked to West Sebois station, four miles away.

The camp was owned by Frank Burton, who it is said had been threatened by Freeman Nadeau, the picturesque outlaw of the Shinn Pond road. The fire was unquestionably of incendiary origin.

## A Thrilling Escape.

When Mrs. Edmunds was awakened by the heat of crackling flames and a great gush of suffocating smoke, she found Mr. Edmunds, already overcome, lying limp and helpless upon the bed, and near the one door were great circles of fire, which spread with terrifying swiftness. It wasn't a time for hysterics or indecision. Seizing the unconscious man in her arms, Mrs. Edmunds groped her way through the smoke and flames—just how she never knew—and a moment later reached a place of safety. Her hair was singed and her night clothing was scorched,

but otherwise she was unharmed.

The cool night air soon revived Mr. Edmunds, and the two tried to save the camp with buckets of water from the lake. The fire had gained too great a headway, however, and in a half hour everything was consumed.

Then Mr. and Mrs. Edmunds waited until daybreak, when they tramped to Sebois station and got food and clothing. On Wednesday they came to the home of Mr. Edmunds' father, Dr. C. D. Edmunds, in Bangor.

## Plainly Incendiary.

There had been no fire in the stove since 5 o'clock on the previous afternoon, and the flames were discovered on the opposite side of the camp. Both Mr. and Mrs. Edmunds are positive an incendiary was at work.

Frank Burton, owner of the camp—which was four miles from the nearest habitation—had been threatened by Freeman Nadeau, the Edmunds say. But the exact cause of Nadeau's enmity is not known, and there is no direct evidence that he was in the vicinity.

Setting fire to an occupied building at night is a crime as serious as murder under the laws of Maine, even though life is not actually taken.

## VALUABLE HINTS FOR POULTRY RAISERS

The following inquiries and answers concerning poultry, taken from an exchange, may be in season just now:

### Festered Feet.

We have White Leghorns and this summer two of them have had swollen feet between the toes and a corn-like place on the bottom of the foot. One foot burst open and the other we opened with a knife. They contained pus which was becoming hard. The cut healed and upon removing the scab the second and third time we pulled out a hard core. The hens limped some when we began treating them, but they didn't seem to be so sore after we opened the places. We used sulphur and lard at first, but now we are using vaseline. They seem better now. Can you give me the name of the disease?—Mrs. R. V., St. Louis.

Ans.—I believe your hens will be all right now. The treatment was not bad at all. The trouble doubtless was not a disease but an injury. It is "bumble foot," and is not uncommon. It may be caused by getting a piece of gravel in the ball of the foot or flying down on the ground from high perches. This produced a sore which festered. A good plan of treatment is first to open the place if necessary and press out any accumulation of pus thoroughly. Sometimes you will find embedded in the foot a piece of gravel or some such cause of the trouble. Then wash out the wound thoroughly with a permanganate of potash solution or a 1 per cent. carbolic acid solution. Then apply the vaseline.

### Under Color in Brahmas.

Can you give me the new undercolor of light Brahmas referred to in a recent issue?—H. O. H.

The American Standard of Perfection describes the under color of light Brahmas as "bluish slate" in all sections except the breast, which is described as "bluish white," the breast where it joins the body being also bluish slate. Formerly undercolor was described as white, bluish white or slate. It might seem that undercolor, where you can't see it, is not of much importance, and it is in fact secondarily to surface color, but the undercolor of the light Brahma has a breeding value. 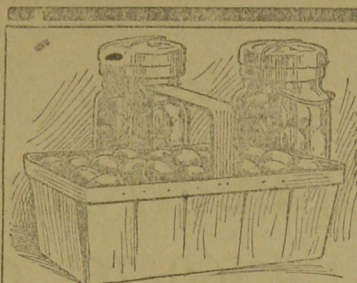
