WILL CELEBRATE ON TRAFALGAR DAY

Day Will be Commemorated by Raising Funds For Soldiers and Sailors.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor has received the following cablegram from Lord Lansdowne:

I have the honor to inform you that the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John are once more proposing to appeal throughout the Empire by street and other collections, upon our day, which has been fixed for the 19th of October. The money received will be devoted to our wounded soldiers and sailors from home and overseas, at the various seats of war.

The generous response which we received last year from all parts of the King's dominions, encourages us to hope that the constantly increasing demand for our help may be met by a corresponding increase of generosity throughout the Empire.

We shall be truly grateful to you if you will assist our work by organizing an appeal and sending the proceeds to us for our sick and wounded at the front. I shall be grateful if you will communicate the contents of this cablegram to your ministers and recommend the proposal to their favorable consideration.

Their Majesties the King and Queen and Her Majesty Queen Alexandra are giving us their gracious patronage, and I trust that you will also see your way to help us in the same splendid manner as you did last year, and that we may have the invaluable assistance also of Mrs. Wood.

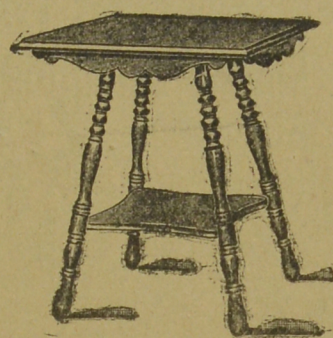
The Antimony Mine.
