MESSRS PINDER AND YOUNG OPPOSED DENTAL BILL

Asked That its Provisions do Not Apply to
Dr. Gerard of This City—Attorney Gen-
eral Declares That all Dentists Must
Comply With the Laws of the Province.

The House resumed at 3.15 on Fri-
day.

Mr. Young presented the report of
the Agricultural Committee.

Hon. Mr. Baxter introduced a bill
relating to the Grand Falls Company,
Limited. In doing so, he said that the
Government had had in hand for some
years \$50,000 deposited by the Com-
pany as a guarantee of the due per-
formance of its agreements. The
Government felt that it was time that
some steps were taken in that direc-
tion, and the bill was to provide power
to forfeit the deposit in case a com-
mencement of the work was not made
within a reasonable time after the
close of the war.

Hon. Mr. Baxter introduced a bill
to amend the Workmen's Compensation
Act. He said that a very advanced
act was in force in Ontario, which
Nova Scotia had also adopted, but not
yet put in force. During recess a com-
mission would be appointed consist-
ing of prominent men drawn from la-
boring and manufacturing representa-
tives, and also insurance specialists,
to inquire into the whole matter and
report upon the Ontario system, with a
view to its adoption in this province.

Hon. Dr. Landry introduced the
usual appropriation bills, which were
immediately referred to a committee
of the whole House and agreed to.

The House again went into commit-
tee, Mr. Smith in the chair, and agreed
to the bill relating to the City of
Moncton, with an amendment.

The Dental Bill.

The bill relating to the New Brun-
swick Dental Society was then taken
up.

Mr. Pinder said this bill was aimed
at preventing a dentist who had prac-
tised as such for many years contin-
uing to do so without going through an
examination. The man he was refer-
ring to came from England, where he
had practised dentistry for years. He
was induced to come to this country
by the immigration authorities, who
held out all sorts of inducements to
him, and when he got here he took up
a farm but had not made much of a
success at it, so he had to fall back
on his profession to make a living for
himself and his family. His health
was not particularly good, and one of
his family was a cripple. He thought
it was most unfair to persecute this
man as he was being persecuted and
attempt to stop him making a living.
He moved an amendment that the bill
should not apply to any person who
had practised dentistry for a period

of three years in the county of York.

Mr. Young seconded the amendment
and said that Mr. Pinder had fully ex-
plained the circumstances of the case,
and the gentleman to whom he had re-
ferred, although he might not be quali-
fied in the sense that he had a diploma,
he was as good a man as any other
dentist in the town, and a great many
people said much better than most.

Dr. Gerard's Case.

Dr. Price regretted that the previous
speakers did not appear to be very fa-
miliar with the workings of the Den-
tal Act. Dr. Gerard had not been per-
secuted, though he had been prosecuted
for practising dentistry without the
necessary qualifications demanded in
this country. He had been fined sev-
eral times, but beforehand had been
afforded every opportunity of present-
ing certificates of qualification if he
had any, but he had never made any
attempt to do so. There was no rea-
son whatever why he should be allow-
ed to practise illegally or why any spe-
cial favor should be granted him any
more than anyone else.

Mr. Pinder said there were a num-
ber of dentists in the city who em-
ployed unqualified assistants. It was
unfair to allow these men to earn a
living and refuse to allow Dr. Gerard
to do the same thing.

Must Obey the Law.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said the principle
involved in the bill did not turn on
the circumstances of the gentleman re-
ferred to. The law of the Province re-
quired that no man could practice den-
tistry without possessing certain qual-
ifications, and it was no good having
such a law and not keeping to it. If
it was a good law it should be abided
by; if not, it should be discarded. If
one man was allowed to practise ille-
gally, where would the evil stop? If
the gentleman referred to had no recog-
nized status in England, why should
he be presented with one in this coun-
try.

Dr. Price said to accept the amend-
ment would be to set aside all that
had been done in the last 24 years.

On a division the amendment was
lost.

Mr. Pinder objected to the section
which permitted a registered dentist
to employ unregistered assistants. He
said that was just the principle that
he complained of.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said these unregis-
tered assistants could only work under
the supervision of their employers. Dr.
Gerrard was unregistered and worked
under no supervision.

The bill was agreed to with amend-
ments.

The House went into committee
with Mr. Munro in the chair, and con-
sidered the bill to amend the act re-
specting taxation of railway compa-
nies.

Hon. Dr. Landry said the bill was
in the nature of a war measure and
called for a tax of from fifty to one
hundred dollars per mile upon the lines
of railway companies, including spurs,
switches, etc. The bill was an exten-
sion of the act passed several years
ago.

Capt. Carson asked if this bill affect-
ed branch lines. He would not like
to see the St. Martins branch railway
have any impositions placed upon it.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said the St. Martins
Railway would not be affected.

The committee took up considera-
tion of the bill respecting the Grand
Falls Co., Ltd.

Mr. J. L. White suggested that the
Hon. Attorney General might come up
to the town of Grand Falls with the re-
presentative of the company and con-
fer with the town council. If this
was done, he felt that a settlement of
matters might speedily be reached. He
would like to have this done so that
when the time came one year after the
declaration of peace upon the termina-
tion of the war, when the deposit of
\$50,000 would be forfeited under this
act.

Hon. Mr. Baxter said he would be
only too pleased to adopt the sugges-
tion thrown out by Mr. White, and he
would take an early opportunity of
paying a visit to that locality, where
he had only been once or twice before
in his life.

The bill was then agreed to.

The bill to amend the Employers' Li-
ability Act was then taken up.

The object of this bill is to widen
the scope of the act by making the em-
ployer liable to pay compensation to a
workman who is killed or injured un-

der any circumstances except his own
wilful negligence while pursuing his
ordinary employment.

Captain Tilley expressed his ap-
proval of the bill and felt that it was
only right that employers should be li-
able to make compensation to work-
men injured under any circumstances,
as long as he was following out his
lawful employment and was not him-
self guilty of negligence.

The bill was agreed to.

The bill to provide for settlement of
land after the war was then taken up.
Hon. Mr. Murray said that he had
fully explained the objects of the bill,
and the proposals it was intended to
adopt when introducing it, and he did
not feel it was necessary to go into the
matter at any length at this stage. The
bill did not outline any scheme, as one
had not definitely been worked out,
but merely provided the machinery to
carry it out when it was determined
upon.

The bill was then agreed to, as was
also the bill relating to the Interna-
tional Railway Co.

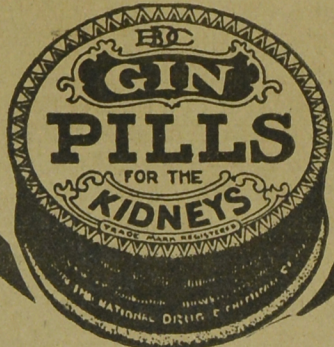
