## CARVELL AND KYTE SAVE NEARLY \$2,000,000 TO CANADA

Price Paid to Yankee Mushroom Concerns Reduced by the Government After Mr. Kyte Made His Charges in the House—Mr. Carvell Praised by Counsel

Ottawa, April 28.—Nine days after George Kyte, M. P., made his fuse contract charges in parliament, the Imperial Munitions Board, under J. W. Flavelle, secured a new deal with the American Ammunition Company, cutting down the original price given by the defunct shell committee by over \$1,500,000. This was the recognition which came dramatically at the close of today's sitting of the Royal Commission to Mr. Carvell and to Mr. Kyte.

The commissioners learned from the official documents that the price originally entered into for fuses from the American Ammunition Co. had been substantially reduced on all the delayed deliveries and that a similar reduction of prices in the contract with the International Arms & Fuse Company was being "considered." Even if nothing further developed in connection with the scandal probe, this saving to the British and Canadian taxpayers amply justifies the men who made the charges.

#### Reduction in Price.

Late in the afternoon sitting, Mr. Hellmuth reached an unusually interesting and significant document. It was a contract between C. B. Gordon, representing the Imperial Munitions Board, and E. B. Cadwell, president of the American Ammunition Co. The organization with which Bassick and Yoakum, and the other Americans whose names are now familiar, were identified. It called on the ostensible ground of failure to meet delivery schedule, for a material reduction in the balance of the company's fuse contracts. On the 1,016,666 undelivered grasee fuses a reduction in price was conceded from \$4 each as originally contracted for by the shell committee, to \$2.34 8-10 each.

On the 831,334 undelivered time fuses a price reduction was effected from \$4.50 to \$4.30 each. The saving by the first reduction was \$1,679,522 and by the second, \$166,666, a total of \$1,846,188. This reduction was effected on April 6, 1916, or nine days after Mr. G. W. Kyte, M. P., had made his disclosures to parliament.

"It would seem that Mr. Carvell ought to be given credit for saving the British Government nearly two million dollars," was the comment of Mr. E. F. B. Johnston, K. C., while Mr. F. H. Markey, K. C., clapped the parliamentarian on the shoulder with the comment: "That's a worth while sort of patriotism."

The pretence presented to parliament by Sir Robert Borden in his original efforts to prevent any investigation, that the Canadian government had nothing to do with the shell committee, the latter being direct agents of the British War Office, was officially swept aside by the production of an important document. Mr. Hellmuth filed a formal contract which apparently determines the respective positions of the Canadian government through the Minister of Militia, and members of the Shell Committee in relation to the manufacture of munitions for Britain. This document, strangely enough, was executed on July 1, a statutory holiday, immediately after the receipt of the cable of June 30 from the British minister of munitions stating that D. A. Thomas was on his way to this country.

tract the Canadian Minister of Militia and not the Shell Committee would appear to be the agent of the British government, and that the civil or manufacturing members of the committee were regarded by the War Office as contractors and not at all as agents with the authority of agents and contractors at the same time. Mr. Hellmuth described their position as "anomalous."

This seemingly puts the investigation on a new and different footing. It had been assumed, by reason of Premier Borden's statements to parliament, that the royal commissioners were to investigate and determine whether the shell committee placed War Office orders for fuses with honesty and good business judgment.

With the Shell Committee regarded by the British government as contractors who could be sued for failure to fulfil their contracts, and not as authorized agents, the whole aspect of the investigation changes. Today's evidence makes the Canadian Government directly responsible, with Sir Sam Hughes, as its Minister of Militia, the immediate agent. It also designates members of the Shell Committee as contractors to whom the Government gave the business, and establishes the concerns who were given contracts to produce shells as mere sub-contractors.

The commission adjourned this evening over Saturday at the earnest and unanimous solicitation of all counsel. It will resume again on Monday.

### LEGISLATURE PROROGUED THIS MORNING

The Provincial Legislature prorogued this morning after a session of seven weeks and one day, one of the longest on record. The House met at 8.20. Some of the legislation passed this session is of more than ordinary importance. In the Bill respecting the St. John & Quebec Railway Company, you have reached a happy settlement of the difficulties connected with this enterprise and have adopted measures which will enable this important work to be completed and ready for operation within a reasonable time.

The Act for the suppression of the traffic in intoxicating liquor gives evidence of great care and labor in its preparation. No effort has been spared to perfect provisions for its successful operation. The present time is opportune for the passage of such a Bill. Its necessity is more apparent than ever before and it is hoped that it may be the means of materially lessening and ultimately completely doing away with the evils resulting from the excessive use of intoxicating liquors.

The Bill to facilitate raising money for patriotic purposes during the continuance of the war is in harmony with the patriotic sentiment of the country.

Other Bills which you have passed I trust will promote the prosperity of the country and the welfare of the people.

I thank you for the liberal provision you have made for the several important services of the province.

I cannot take leave of you without making a brief reference to the one subject which overshadows all others, and in comparison with which our local matters sink into utter insignificance. We realize more vividly than ever before the terrible nature of this great war in which we are engaged. 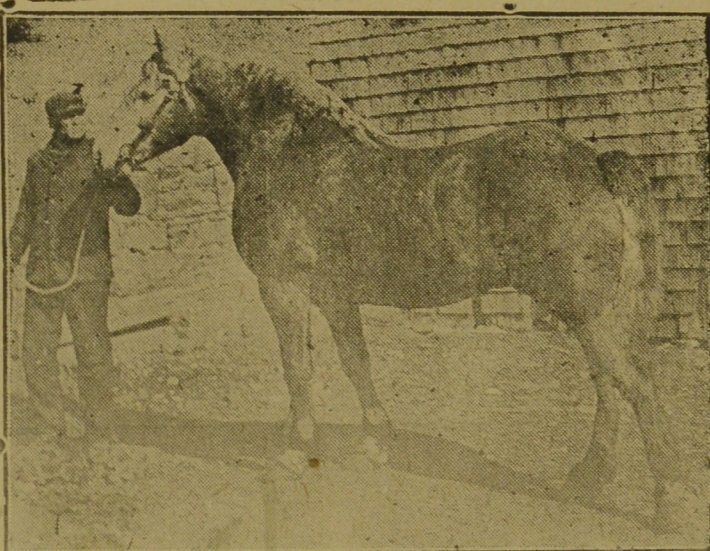
