

#### BAPTIST DIVINE

## GASLIGHT CO. MAKES NEW PROPOSITION TO CITY

> The Fredericton Gaslight Company has made another offer to the city with regard to lighting the city's streets. The offer is contained in a letter from Mr. J. J. F. Winslow. A test of one year's duration is proposed, the company to supply electric current delivered at the Carleton street power-house. The letter states that it will be necessary for the city to purchase only the necessary transformers. At the end of the year the city, if dissatisfied, may purchase the new generator to be installed by the company and manufacture its own current. The rate to be charged for this service is to be determined by the Public Utilities Com mission under the offer.

The company also renews its offer of current for 31 cents per kilowatt. The letter says the City Council cannot make current as cheaply as the company and can save \$2000 per year by embracing the proposition.
