BAPTIST DIVINE DIES SUNDENLY

Rev. Dr. E. M. Saunders, a well known Baptist divine and for many years a leader in the church life of the Maritime Provinces but since 1913 a resident of Toronto, died suddenly at Ottawa on Wednesday, at the residence of his son, John C. Saunders. He was returning home from a visit to Halifax. He was born at Aylesford, N.S., in 1829. The funeral will take place from the residence of Senator Dennis on Saturday, for interment in Halifax. He is survived by one son and two daughters, one of the latter, Miss Marshall Saunders, being famed as an authoress.

Rev. Dr. Saunders was well known in Fredericton and frequently visited the city. In the early nineties, when the Brunswick Street Baptist church was without a pastor, he supplied the pulpit for over a year.

Concerning the late Dr. Saunders, a Halifax despatch says:

"Rev. Dr. E. M. Saunders, whose death occurred at Ottawa today, was one of the best known clergymen in Nova Scotia. Born in 1829, for forty nine years he was minister of the First Baptist church of this city and for nine years previously was minister of the Baptist church at Berwick, N.S. He was a governor of Acadia College and was considered one of the strongest preachers in the Eastern Provinces.

"Dr. Saunders was a historian and writer as well as theologian. His history of the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces was published in 1902 and more recently there came from his pen the 'Three Premiers of Nova Scotia.' These works established his reputation as a trenchant, careful writer. He has been engaged on a 'Life of Sir Charles Tupper,' the veteran statesman having given him a large number of his papers with a view to the publication of such a work. It is understood that Dr. Saunders had practically completed his task."

GASLIGHT CO. MAKES NEW PROPOSITION TO CITY

Offers Trial For One Year, Public
Utilities Commission to Set
The Rate.

The Fredericton Gaslight Company has made another offer to the city with regard to lighting the city's streets. The offer is contained in a letter from Mr. J. J. F. Winslow. A test of one year's duration is proposed, the company to supply electric current delivered at the Carleton street power-house. The letter states that it will be necessary for the city to purchase only the necessary transformers. At the end of the year the city, if dissatisfied, may purchase the new generator to be installed by the company and manufacture its own current. The rate to be charged for this service is to be determined by the Public Utilities Commission under the offer.

The company also renews its offer of current for 3 1/2 cents per kilowatt. The letter says the City Council cannot make current as cheaply as the company and can save \$2000 per year by embracing the proposition.

Kent Opposition Picks Three Winners

Rexton, March 15.—That a wave of opposition is sweeping over Kent was evidenced today by the large convention at Rexton to choose candidates in opposition to the Provincial Government. Among the delegates were numerous old-time supporters of the present administration. The candidates chosen were Allison Dysart, Phileas Melanson and A. J. Bordage. L. A. Dugal, M. P. P., and P. J. Veniot, opposition organizer, accompanied by Dr. E. A. Smith, president of the Provincial Opposition Association, were present, and delivered strong addresses. The convention was the largest ever held in this country. Besides the naming of candidates the convention organized a strong county association.

PROHIBITORY LEGISLATION COMING AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, March 16.—The Dominion Government intends to introduce legislation on the subject of prohibition. At a caucus of its supporters this morning the subject was discussed and measures on the question were forecast. Notice of it is expected to be given this evening.

SOLDIERS SUFFER FROM PTOMAIN POISONING

Halifax, March 16.—Fifteen men taking a course with the R. C. G. A. at the Citadel were poisoned yesterday, and were taken to the military hospital. One of the men was in a very serious condition. He rallied, however, and it is expected that all will be better in a day or two.

Ptomaine poisoning is believed to be responsible.

ST. PATRICK'S CONCERT.

The annual St. Patrick's Day concert will be given tomorrow night in the City Opera House under the auspices of Division No. 1, A.O.H. His Honor Judge Carleton of Woodstock will give an address. An excellent program has been prepared, including all the best local talent.

Another War Loan Soon To Be Floated

New York, March 16.—A group of American bankers headed by J. P. Morgan & Co., are negotiating with the Canadian government for the flotation of a new Canadian loan, according to a statement issued by the Morgan firm today. The amount has not been finally determined, but it was intimated that it would be in the neighborhood of \$75,000,000.

SHAMROCKS FOR SOLDIERS.

London, March 16.—John Redmond has made the necessary arrangements

with the Admiralty, the War Office and the post office, to ensure that a generous supply of shamrocks will be delivered to the Irish regiments in France and Flanders, and to Irish sailors in the fleet for to-morrow, St. Patrick's day.

Miss Wilice Carr, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David B. Carr of Geary, passed away yesterday at her home after a lengthy illness. The deceased was aged nineteen years. She is survived by her parents, three brothers, Preston, Alden and Ashley, and one sister, Miss Belle Carr, all of Geary. The funeral will take place Friday afternoon with service at the house at one o'clock.
