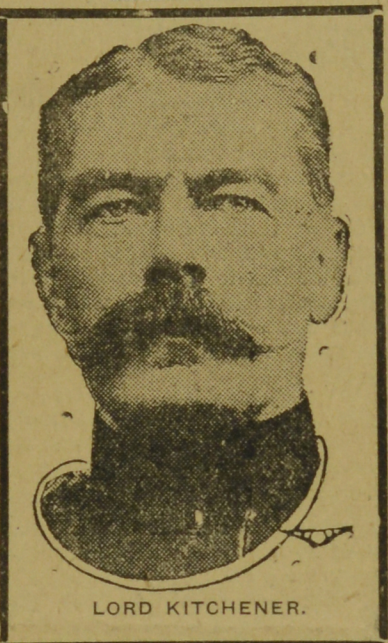

MUST REMOVE WAGON.

The proprietor of the lunch-wagon in Phoenix Square has been notified to remove the wagon within ten days, his license having expired. Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, protested to the City Council that the lunch-wagon was unsightly. There is also the possibility that it is situated upon government and not upon city property. Dr. Carter also protested against horses being tied to the Normal School fence, along Phoenix Square. The police have instructions to prevent this.

NO BILL BY GRAND JURY IN DUNCAN CASE

The York County Court met this morning. One criminal case was on the docket, that of The King vs John Duncan, for obstructing and interfering with Policeman Charles Marshall during a recent search for liquor at Long's Hotel. The grand jury in this case brought in no bill and the accused was discharged. The witnesses before the grand jury were Policeman Marshall and A. Peterson of Marysville. Mr. P. J. Hughes appeared for the defence.

In the civil docket the only case was that of William T. Howe, sheriff of York and assignee for William Pond, vs The Frost & Wood Company, Ltd. Mr. C. D. Richards is counsel for the plaintiff, and Mr. G. H. Y. Belyea of St. John, for the defendant. The case will be heard on Friday next, court adjourning until that day.

The grand jury presented an address in which it was suggested that the County Council pay better attention to the property at the rear of the Court House, also that gaol prisoners be fed better and that special provision be made for juvenile offenders.

THE FUSE ENQUIRY NEARING ITS CLOSE

Ottawa, June 6.—Evidence given before the Meredith-Duff Commission this morning was indicative of an early close of the investigation.

It was testimony which went a little more deeply into phases touched upon in the opening days, but of features of more than ordinary interest there were none.

Chief investigation centred around a quotation of the Canadian Allis-Chalmers company for time fuses made in November, 1914, and how the figures were reached.

Evidence was further given that it would have been "suicidal" for the Canadian Car and Foundry Company to place orders for fuses for its Russian shells in Canada, owing to difficulties in securing labor.

Chief's Statement.

Chief of Police McCollom, when asked today about the incident referred to by Ald. Wilkinson, said:

"I received no telephone message with regard to the matter of the boys being in the barn. I had a case on in court and was waiting for it. Mr. Estabrooks came to me in front of the City Hall and said that he had been told over the phone that the boys were in the barn. I tried to get in touch with Policeman Hughes, who was patrolling, but could not find him. I then telephoned Policeman Marshall at his house. He ran down Brunswick street and I went out York and we met at the corner of York and Brunswick. We went toward Charlotte street and got in Roy Smith's auto. When we reached the barn I learned that the boys had left before any message had been telephoned, a woman having taken some bottles of beer from them and frightening them off. We went up the Woodstock Road in the car but saw no trace of the boys, who had bicycles. It was not fifteen minutes from the time Mr. Estabrooks told me until our arrival at the barn."

LARGE CITY LOAN.

At a special meeting last week the City Council arranged for a loan of seventy thousand dollars from the Equitable Trust Company of New York at an interest rate of 3 1/2 per cent. This loan was arranged because local banks had increased their interest rates to 5 1/2 per cent. The loan is for a short term.

ner's silent but effective work, they had never been able to fathom his personality. A cockney non-commissioned officer who had seen much service under him, summed up the general opinion of him when he said of Kitchener: "E's no talker—not 'im—'e's all steel and h'ice."

Kitchener was indifferent to popularity, particularly among women, and though feted all over the world in social circles, he never married.

Was Appointed Secretary of State for War

Soon After the Great Struggle Broke Out

Earl Kitchener was appointed Secretary of State for War on August 8, 1914, a few days after Great Britain's declaration of war on Germany. He was regarded as England's greatest soldier, and the decision of the government to entrust him with supreme direction of the war, was received with unanimous approval.

Notwithstanding the criticism directed at times against Earl Kitchener, his great accomplishments during the war are recognized universally. Foremost of his achievements is the creation from England's untrained manhood, of a huge army.

SIR FREDERIC DONALDSON

AMONG THE VICTIMS

Ottawa, June 6.—Sir Frederick Donaldson, one of Earl Kitchener's party,

was munitions adviser to Lloyd George. He visited Canada last fall on the invitation of D. A. Thomas (Baron Rhonda) to study the possibility of manufacturing heavy ordnance in this country. He was formerly chief superin-

tendent or ordnance at Woolwich Arsenal.
